REPORT FOR 2016-17

INTRODUCTION

During 2016-17 in addition to its regular humanitarian activities, Maharashtra State Branch and its districts continued their activities in accordance with the Plan of Action framed by the National Headquarters, IRCS, New Delhi.

Jalgaon Winter Relief

In December 2016 the Hon. Secretary of Jalgaon District Branch requested relief materials due to severe drop in temperatures in interiors of Jalgaon. The following materials were immediately despatched:

On 27th April 2016, the New Indian First Aid Manual IFAM which is prepared by Indian Red Cross Society and the Belgian Red Cross Flanders was inaugurated by H. E. Greet Bourgeois, Minister-President of the Government of Flanders, Belgium at the Trident Hotel, Bandra-Kurla Complex, Mumbai, Maharashtra. This was organized by the Indian Red Cross Society Maharashtra State Branch.

The First Aid Training Programme undertaken by the Maharashtra State since 2013 has conducted around 207 trainings and trained 1424 people till date.

Dissemination Activities included a 5 day State Level First Aid / First Medical Responder training programme at Ulhasnagar. A 4 day District level First Aid / First

Medical Responder training programme in Mumbai, Barshi and Jalgaon. 5 FMR/ FA and Disaster Response Community level meetings were conducted in Betegaon, Moregave Vagatpada and Gudave in Palghar District. Similarly in Kadhari, Kusube Khurdh, Bhagave Chowk and Bhavani Chowk in Jalgaon. There were 40 participants in each village in both the Districts. Under the Youth Program the IRCS Maharashtra State Branch staff visited Pune for orientation and detail activity implementation. Two 1 day Community First Aid training held in Pune. A one day J/YRC Counsellors refreshers training programme was held at Maharashtra Arogya Mandal, Pune. Similarly a 4 day J/YRC students training programme was held at the same venue. Apart from the basics in First Aid topics like importance of safe water storage, proper sanitation facilities and drainage system and basics on solid waste management Under the Rural Livelihood Project a livelihood need assessment were taught. was conducted by the Maharashtra State Branch in Gondia and Bhandara District Branches. Selected villages were identified for project implementation. Agriculture training, making organic fertilizer, earthworms for making vermicompost pits were distributed to farmers. Total 2100 kg gram seeds were distributed 81 farmers. A crop output assessment was done in March 2017 resulting in total produce of 4687 kg. Under the Monitoring Project implementation and planning micro irrigation strategies mapping of water resources has been done which can develop for micro irrigation.

Founded by Dr. Rustomji B. Billimoria in 1912 as a T.B. Sanatorium, Bel-Air stands on the sprawling 44 acres of land known as Dalkeith in Panchgani, Satara District, which was gifted by Sir Dorabji Tata. Handed over to Red Cross in 1964, this 240 bedded hospital consists of 58 heritage bungalows.

Since 1994 the Hospital enlarged its mission to address the challenges of an unfolding disaster relating to HIV/AIDS. This was at a time when hospitals refused to admit them, Government had no program and Anti-Retroviral Therapy (ART) was not available. Families abandoned patients and dead bodies were not even claimed due to the high level of stigma and discrimination.

Bel-Air pioneered treatment and care of HIV/AIDS patients in India and is one of the best treatment centers in the country and is a National Training Centre today. Bel-Air admitted and treated more than twenty thousand HIV/AIDS patients until today. Dr. A.P. J. Abdul Kalam, as the President of India, visited Bel-Air in 2003.

As TB is making a resurgence, Bel-Air is fully committed to continue its original mission of combating TB, now with the added dimension of treating MDR TB. As part of the RNTCP Bel-Air is running a TB Unit and Drug Resistant TB Center for Government of Maharashtra.

In 2014, Bel-Air Hospital was awarded the Times of India Healthcare Achievers Award 2014 for being the best in India in the category of "Innovation in managing long term condition".

Another attraction in this campus is the Nursing College – the first of its kind in India, with the collaboration of the University of Illinois at Chicago. Our nurses are placed in reputed hospitals like Breach Candy in Mumbai.

Simultaneously, a 2 year Nursing Training Program of Midwives sponsored by Johnson & Johnson is being conducted for 60 poor rural girls of Maharashtra.

Bombay City Branch continued with its rural development programs of humanitarian assistance to the villages. During the year 43 toilets were constructed at Towerwadi, in collaboration with Kushtorog Nivaran Samiti at a cost of Rs. 10 Lakhs. Under the "Power to Write" program notebooks along with school stationeries were distributed in schools in various villages.

Barshi Sub-District Branch is running a deaf and dumb school for 116 students recognized by the Government of Maharashtra. During the year drinking water was supplied to 3 villages . 1566 people were benefitted. The IRCS Maharashtra State Branch in 2015-16 had donated Rs.2 lakhs to the Barshi Sub-District to purchase a water tanker.

Jalgaon District Branch has opened a information center related to blood bank as a one stop window program.

Nagpur District Branch during the World Aids week included a counseling and knowledge session about STD/HIV/ AIDS and legalities of prostitution.

Pune District Branch continued the laudable activities of free medical check-ups and free treatment of patients at their OPD centre at M.G. Road, Rashta Peth. Drought relief work was carried out at Khalad and Ekatpur villages of Purandar Taluka, 8 kms from Saswad situated on the banks of the Karha river which were severely hit by drought over the last 2 years. On the World Red Cross Day Ms. Siddhi Mane a Student of Std. VIII a Chetna Dattaji Gaikwad High School, Khadki was declared a winner of a prize for drawing competition conducted by IRCS National Headquarters, New Delhi. Her poster is declared to be among top three posters. Junior / Youth Red Cross Pune organized 3 day Youth Leadership and Disaster Management camp. A condolence meeting was held at the Pune Red Cross School for deaf on 1st October 2016 to mourn the sad demise of Chairman Mr. N.A.P. Nanavati who expired on 20th September 2016. A condolence meeting was held on 19th November 2016 at Red Cross School for deaf to mourn the sad demise of Hon. Treasurer Mr. N. K. Mahajan on 9th November 2016.

The Gopabai Damani Blood Bank in Solapur conducted a unique activity. 120 children received regular blood transfusion throughout the year free of cost. These children come from surrounding districts of Maharashtra and Karnataka. During the year, they had given 2007 units of packed Red Cells to Thalassemics and 178 units of Fresh Frozen Plasma for Hemophiliacs.

The Thane District Branch conducts Bone Mineral Density camps once in every three months in Red Cross Bhavan in collaboration with Meyer Pharmaceuticals. A "water conservation project" was taken up in collaboration with Bharat Scouts at Jambhulpada, Yeeor hills, Thane on 29/05/2018.

The OPD at Ulhasnagar Sub-District Branch had 27 consulting doctors in various disciplines treating 23500 patients out of which 470 were free / concessional. 4600 patients were treated at their General Dispensary at nominal cost of Rs.20 per day.

Baramati, Barshi, Chopda, Jalgaon, Latur, Mumbai, Nanded, Pandharpur, Ratnagiri, Sangli, Solapur, Udgir are the operational Red Cross Blood Banks in Maharashtra State.

The Junior Red Cross activities were carried out in Mumbai City as well as Bhandara, Pune, Nashik, Gondia, Yavatmal, Dhule and Raigad districts.

At the end of the year 2016-17 there were Junior Red Cross units in 105 schools and Youth Red Cross groups in 29 colleges with a total membership of 1,03,200 juniors and 12,800 youth.

The Junior Red Cross develops leadership qualities amongst young children in schools, colleges and the community at large. It organizes competitions in various fields, such as Poster Painting, Greeting Card making, Collage creating, Best out of Waste, Solo Dance and Hindustani Classical Singing . It also undertakes Training Camps, Picnics, Consumer Guidance Seminars, First Aid Training programmes, observance of World Red Cross Day and inculcates awareness of various health topics. Junior Red Cross has provided educational inputs to over 6000 students in Raigad Zilla Parishad Primary Schools, Vasai, Shahpur and Mumbai City.

- Projects for the Underprivileged Children : from July 2016 we have commenced with training in personality development, creating awareness of health and hygiene, environmental awareness among the slum children with the support of two NGO's respectively i.e. Sabka Malik Ek, Foundation, Kurla and Indira Gandhi Memorial Balvidya Mandir, Cuffe Parade. Developing the public speaking and writing skills among the children by overcoming fear for English Language. 100 students from Std V to XII are been trained in above mentioned programmes. These students are from different schools and College of Cuffe Parade, Kurla, Chembur, Bhandup and Vashi Naka slums.
- International Youth Exchange Programme at Japan: The Japanese Red Cross organized an International Youth Exchange Programme at Tokyo from 28th October to 7th November 2016. The objective of this programme was to promote International Understanding, Friendship, Social Values amongst the Junior/Youth Red Cross & Red Crescent Members in Asia Pacific region. Youth Volunteers from 22 Asian countries participated. Mst. Shlok Machchar, Youth Red Cross Volunteer from Maharashtra was selected along with youth volunteer girl from Punjab represented as India youth delegates.
- Burhani (India) Poster Making Competitions: The Junior Red Cross in coordination with Burhani Foundation (India) organised Poster Making Competition at 2 zones in Mumbai and Navi Mumbai. 250 students participated.

Annual Prize Distribution Function: The Junior Red Cross Annual Prize * Distribution Function was held on 17th February 2017 at Homi J.H.Taleyarkhan Memorial Hall, Fort was a thumping success. Over 200 children, principals, teachers, Junior Red Cross Members and distinguished guests attended the programme. An audio – visual presentation by Honorary Secretary Rajesh Satghar covered the numerous activities of the Junior Red Cross. Chief Guest Kyoshi Shihan Vispy Kapadia, India's Leading Karate Exponent, regaled the audience with his wit and humour and went on to highlight the vital importance of self defence in these violent times. Guest of Honour Raj Anadkat well known TV and film actor, motivated the youth by emphasizing the failures are but stepping stones to success. Junior Red Cross Chairman, Godrej N. Dotivala, presided over the function. More than a hundred trophies, medals and certificates were presented to the winners of various competitions conducted during the year. Quite a few principals, teachers and volunteers were awarded special certificates for their sterling contribution towards Junior Red Cross. The prestigious Best Active School Trophy 2016-17 was won by St. Xavier's High School, Borivli (East).

First Aid

Apart from St. John, the Red Cross is now also mandated to provide training in "First Aid" which is part of Disaster Management. The First Aid training programme is meant to enhance the capacity of the in-house people (staff) in saving lives during emergencies. The training is provided to NGOs, Housing Society Associations, Companies, Institutions and groups of individuals who wish to be trained.

The Indian Red Cross Society Maharashtra State Branch started its FIRST AID Training Programme in November 2013 and till date has conducted around 207 trainings and trained 1424 people.

New Indian First Aid Manual Inauguration

On 27th April 2016, the New Indian First Aid Manual IFAM which is prepared jointly by Indian Red Cross Society and the Belgian Red Cross Flanders was inaugurated by H.E Greet Bourgeois, Minister- President of the Government of Flanders, Belgium

at the Trident Hotel, BKC, Mumbai, Maharashtra. The other dignitaries present on the occasion were Ms. Mary Werntz, Head of Regional Delegation ICRC, Prof. Dr. Philippe Vandekerckhove, CEO, Belgian Red Cross, Mr. Jan Luykx, Ambassador of Belgium to India, Dr. Veer Bhushan, Joint Secretary, Indian Red Cross Society NHQ, Mr. Manish Choudhary, Director, Indian Red Cross Society, NHQ and Mr. S.C.Goyal, Vice-Chairman, St. John Ambulance, India, Mr. Hugo Geuvens, Country delegate, Belgium Red Cross and Mr. Suresh Deora, Member, Managing Committee, Indian Red Cross Society, Maharashtra State Branch & Member, Managing Body IRCS, NHQ

The first aid training was conducted by the Indian Red Cross Society Maharashtra State Branch, Dr. Vikas N. Kurne, First Aid trainer and Disaster Management Coordinator. This was the 1st first aid training based on evidence based first aid manual (IFAM). The participants were students from Bel Air College of Nursing, employees from Mazgaon Dock Ltd., and students from Wilson College, Mumbai.

The IFAM is the first scientific evidence based first aid manual adapted to Indian customs and culture eg., Evidence has proved that ash is equally effective as soap and can be used to wash hands, if soap is not available. Also described in the manual is section on cardiopulmonary resuscitation and emergency care cardiovascular care by International Liaison Committee on Resuscitation (ILCOR).

Dissemination Activities

A 5 Day State Level First Aid /First Medical Responder training programme

Ulhasnagar

According to the plan of action 2016, approved by National Headquarter, MSB organized 5 days state level FA/FMR training program at Ulhasnagar Sub- District Branch, from 29th August 2016 to 2nd September 2016. The training was organized in the Red Cross Hall at Ulhasnagar. Training was for full days from 9.30 am to 5.30 pm. Dr. Vikas Kurne, Dr. Pratibha Phatak, Mr. Rajendra Lokhande, Mr. Bharat kumar Phunage, Prof. Chandrarte and Mr. Brahmdande facilitated the training.

There were 38 participants from Mumbai, Thane & Ulhasnagar who came from various backgrounds such as NSS Students, Teachers and Red Cross Members & Volunteers. There was a lot of enthusiasm and eagerness shown by the participants during the five day programme.

The programme was inaugurated by the chief guest Mr Vishin H. Rajai Hon. Secretary Ulhasnagar Sub- District Branch, Mr. R.P. Bhatia Joint Secretary, Mr. S.S.Chotowani Jayshri, Mr. Ahuja and Red Cross Members were present.

The participants were taught the FA/FMR which included power point presentation and practical sessions. Topics covered were Introduction to First Aid, Bleeding/ Wounds, Poisoning, Burns and CPR, Recovery Position, Convulsions, Choking, Drowning and methods of tying bandages .Household Water treatment, Dead body Management, Hygiene promotion and sanitation, Nutrition and Food Security, Safe Storage and handling Emergencies, Basics on Disaster Management.

Dr Pratibha Phatak conducted the session on "Nutrition". She gave many tips, which are very useful to face malnutrition problems.

On the final day (i.e. The 5th day) of the training an exam was conducted for participant's assessment. Exam consisted of Written exam (15 marks), Viva (15 marks) and Practical test (20 marks).

All the participants were given Participation Certificates. The participants were also asked to fill in the feedback forms for evaluation of the trainers and share their experiences and knowledge and skill which they received during the five days of the training.

At the end of the final session, the committee members felicitated the five trainers and two staff Mr. Senir Dolas (State Programme Manager, MSB) and Mr. Manojkumar Sakat (First Aid Coordinator, MSB). They thanked Maharashtra State Branch for providing support for the FA/FMR training programme.

Three 4 Day District Level FA/ FMR Training Programmes in Mumbai, Barshi and Jalgaon

Mumbai

A 4 day District Level First Aid / First Medical Responder (FA/FMR) Training was organised by Maharashtra State Branch from 3rd to 6th October 2016 at City Institute of Disaster Management of MCGM. Training was for full day from 9.00 am to 5.00 pm. 35 volunteers from different backgrounds such as Teachers, Community Health Worker (CHW), BMC Staff and NSS Students participated. Dr. Vikas Kurne, Mr. Rajendra Lokhande, Mr. Bharatkumar Phunage and Mr. Bhrahmadande were the trainers. There was lot of enthusiasm and eagerness shown by the participants during the Four Day programme.

The programme was inaugurated by Mr.Rajendra Lokhande - DM Officer, MCGM, Dr. Rajan Parange – Examiner, Dr. Vikas Kurne – DM Coordinator, Mr. Charles Pal (Exe-Secretary, Mr. Senir Dolas – Project Manager and Mr. Manojkumar Sakat. were also present for the programme.

The participants were taught the "Basics of First Aid" which included power point presentation and practical sessions. Topics covered were Introduction to First Aid, bleeding/wounds, poisoning, burns and CPR, recovery position, convulsions, choking, drowning and methods of tying bandages. Nutrition & Food Security, Water and Sanitation / Personal Hygiene . Training included also pre monsoon preparations to cope with floods & precautions during floods & fire.

On the final day (i.e. the 4th day) of the training an exam was conducted for participant's assessment. Exam consisted of Written exam (15 marks), Viva (15 marks) and Practical test (20 marks).

Barshi

4 days district level FA/FMR training program at Barshi. from 12th to 15th October 2016. The training was organized in the Barshi Blood Bank Hall. Training was for full day from 9.00 am to 5.00 pm. Dr. Vikas Kurne facilitated the training. 35 participants were participated. The participants came from various backgrounds such as teachers, Police, Blood Bank Staff, students.

Five FMR/FA & Disaster Response Meetings were conducted as under :

As the farmers working in farms are at risk of snake bites (poisoning), a session was taken on snake poisoning & how to minimize infection. With the help of trainers they were educated through demonstrations. They were also taught how to stop bleeding, treatment for epilepsy, fractures & burning. Training included also pre monsoon preparations to cope with floods & precautions during floods & fire.

Youth Program

Pune visit

Indian Red Cross Maharashtra State Branch staff Mr. Senir Dolas and Mr. Manoj Sakat visited Pune from 4th to 5th August 2016 for youth programme Meeting.

The objective of the visit

- To discus and finalise Plan of action with district branch and selected villages.
- To assess the work carried out by the counselors in the selected villages for the youth Program.
- To plan and design skill development of J/YRC teachers and students and also finalize the interventions to/ activities to be carried out in targeted area.

Activity carried out.

- 1. Visited district branch and select villages where program is to be implemented meet community people and further plan of action was discussed.
- 2. Conducted meeting with community people and 1day community First Aid trainings are planned on 27th & 28th August 2016 in both the selected villages
- 3. WASH IEC material collection is started by district branch which will be compiled and printed for use.
- 4. Places are identified for wall painting after rains on WASH awareness so that it will be visible to maximum number of people in community.

5. It was found that Counselors who are trained through Red Cross are doing awareness on WASH in the selected villages / schools.

Two 1day Community First Aid Training at Pune

Maharashtra State Branch organized 2 one day First Aid trainings at Borghar and Ambde village Pune District, on 27th and 28thAugust 2016. The trainings were organized in school. Training was for full day from 9.30 am to 5.30 pm. Sachin Pardashi and Aditi sawant facilitated the training. 35 villagers from Borghar and 36 villagers from Ambde attended the training. There was lot of enthusiasm and eagerness shown by the participants during the three day programme.

The participants were taught the "Basics of First Aid" which included power point presentation and practical sessions. Topics covered were Introduction to First Aid, bleeding/wounds, poisoning, burns and CPR, recovery position, convulsions, choking, drowning and methods of tying bandages.

The participants were also asked to give feedback and share their experiences and knowledge and skill which they received during the training.

A 1 Day Counsellors Refresher Training

There was lot of enthusiasm and eagerness shown by the participants during the Training.

The participants were trained on the following topics which included power point presentation and sessions. Topics covered were Basics on Hygiene Promotion (Personal and Environmental), Basics on Vector Control and prevention measures, Household Water Treatment and importance of safe storage, Importance of Proper Sanitation Facilities and drainage system, Basics on Solid Waste Management.

A 4 Day J/YRC Students Training

Maharashtra State Branch organized under Youth Programme a 4-day J/YRC Students training programme at Maharashtra Arogya Mandal, Pune from 27th to 30th September 2016. The training was organized in the Dayanand Training Centre. Training was for full day from 9.30 am to 5.30 pm. Vikek Naidu, Rahul Pokharkar, Dr. Rajkumar Shah, Dr. R. Joshi & Ganesh Pujari facilitated the training. There were 18 students. There was lot of enthusiasm and eagerness shown by the participants during the Training.

The participants were trained on the following topics which included power point presentation and sessions. Topics covered were: Introduction to RC Movement and its FP, Introduction to First Aid, bleeding/wounds, poisoning, burns and CPR, recovery position, convulsions, choking, drowning, methods of tying bandages, Basics on Hygiene Promotion (Personal and Environmental), Basics on Vector Control and prevention measures, Household Water Treatment and importance of safe storage, Importance of Proper Sanitation Facilities and drainage system, Basics on Solid Waste Management. Participants were also thought how do Hygiene Promotion/ Steps in doing Hygiene Promotion in the communities,

On the final day of the training an exam was conducted for participant's assessment. Exam consisted of Written exam (15 marks), Viva (15 marks) and Practical Test (20 marks).

All the participants were given Participation Certificates. The participants were also asked to fill in the feedback forms for evaluation of the trainer and share their experiences and knowledge and skill which they received during the four days of the training.

Pune visit

Indian Red Cross Maharashtra State Branch staff Mr. Senir Dolas, Mr. Manoj Sakat and Mr. John and Dr. Parag Borkar from ICRC visited Pune District Branch from 28th Feb to 2nd March 2017 as part of youth programme.

The objective of the visit

- To meet district and take updates of programme and discussed activities to be carried out this year with School/Colleges and selected villages.
- Visiting selected schools/colleges and understand their yearly plan and plan activities as per students and teacher's availability and integrate programme component in other school/college activities.
- Visiting selected villages meeting with community people and understand specific community issues to be focus on as per youth programme.

Activity carried out.

- 1. Visited district branch and youth programme updates were taken. Dr. Parag Borkar presented youth programme concept to District Branch Secretary and staff. Activity to be carried this year were discussed and there expected outcome.
- 2. Meeting with B.D Kale College counsellors and students who are part of youth programme and oriented on activities to be carried out this year in school/ colleges and communities and their involvement in programme.
- 3. Meeting with community members at selected villages (Borghar & Amde) and understand specific community issues to be focus on as per youth programme.

Pune visit

Indian Red Cross Maharashtra State Branch Gen. Secretary K. Krishnadasan, Asst. Gen. Secretary T. B Sakloth, Mr. Senir Dolas and Mr. Manojkumar Sakat visited Pune from 15th to16thFebruary 2017 for youth programme Meeting.

The objective of the visit

- To discus and finalise Plan of action with Pune district branch.
- To meet counselors in the selected villages for the youth Program.
- To plan orientation session for counsellors.
- To start wall painting.

Activity carried out.

- 1. Visited district branch further plan of action was discussed.
- 2. Conducted meeting with community people and counsellors and orientation session is planned on 1stMarch 2017 in the selected villages
- 3. Wall painting work given to local painter which will be monitor by counsellors and villagers

Rural Livelihood Project

Three day Livelihood Need Assessment training

Maharashtra State Branch organised a 3 Day Livelihood Need Assessment training from 1st to 3rd April 2016 in Gondia. Participants were taught how to collect data, what questions to be asked, what to observe etc. Suman Saxena from NHQ, John George & Sahadeo Rawoot from ICRC was present for training. Sahadeo Rawoot facilitated training. 21 participants were participated.

Need Assessment Programme

Need Assessment was conducted jointly by MSB, Gondia District Branch, NHQ and ICRC with the help of trained volunteers in identified villages by District Branches from 4th to 10th April 2016. The assessment team conducted 4 focus group discussions with the community members in the 4 identified villages and 15-20% randomly

selected households were visited to collect preliminary household level data. In total four focus group discussions were conducted and 159 households interviewed to collect data. Assessment team met with a four key informants in Bhandara & Gondia namely with the District Collectors of both districts, the Tehsildar of Salekasa Taluka & the Civil Surgeon of Bhandara and other stake holders to collect secondary data. Mr. Sahadeo Rawoot, Mr. John George (ICRC) Mrs. Suman Saxena from NHQ, Mr. Senir Dolas, Programme Manager (MSB) & Mr. Manoj kumar Sakat, FA/FMR Coordinator (MSB) were also present.

Livelihood Programme Progress Report

With the help of district volunteers Murkudo 1, 2, 3, Tekatola & Dandari villages were selected for project implementation and community meetings were organised to explain intervention to villagers. Agriculture training was conducted for selected beneficiaries. Total 2100 kg of Seeds were purchased from Mahabeej and distributed to 81 farmers to enable them to cultivate at least 1 acre and 76 drums along with 1kg gram, flour/ besan and 1kg jaggery for making organic fertiliser and pesticide were given. Simultaneously meetings were conducted with District Collectors, Tehsildar, Centre & District Agriculture officer, ATMA State Agriculture training centre, Mahabeej office, Local Organic Farming Expert, Sarpanch & Community leaders to know and link with government schemes and trainings which can help farmers.

28 farmers have been given earthworm for making vermicompost pits as guided by local agriculture expert and volunteers. Soil testing was done. Mapping of water resources has been done which can be developed for micro irrigation by District Branch.

Monitoring visits were conducted in January 2017 and jointly with ICRC in March 2017 it was observed that gram crops were doing fairly well. The beneficiaries were taking care of the crops and protecting them from pests (including wild and domestic animals) The majority of the beneficiaries tried new organic farming methodology and generally satisfied with the crops The beneficiaries used the available irrigation facilities (the stream, ponds and wells) to irrigate the crops in the beginning The current water sources are not adequate to cover irrigation needs of all the farmers.

Some of the farmers did not have adequate pipes to carry water till their areas of cultivation. The crops were facing challenges linked with pests; however, the organic pesticides were used effectively to control the pests. The farmers have started harvesting the crops; however majority of the harvest was expected to be started after 15 March. The soil testing report is prepared for some of sampled farmers. Overall report shows that the land quality on medium with low organic elements. Some of the micro-nutrients like iron and zinc are found low in the samples.

The Branch could not do crop insurance as the area does not include for rabbi crops by the authorities and therefore, the government insurance facility was not available. The team meet the District Collector who expressed happiness about the activities of the Red Cross. He recommended supporting the communities in increasing rice (paddy) cultivation during monsoon and also ensuring that agro produce is properly marketed. He encouraged Red Cross to sell the produce to the consumers by opening its own outlets (mainly alongside the highways). Some of the beneficiaries informed that the seeds distribution could have been a couple of weeks earlier and that would have facilitated better crops.

A crops output assessment was done from 15th to 20th March 2017. Total Produce was 4687 kg. Farmers were satisfied with the production.

Monitoring Project implementation and planning micro irrigation strategies

Total 2100 kg of seeds distributed to 81 farmers & 76 drums distributed to farmers in month of November 2016. Out of which 78 farmers had sown seeds which has grown based on the availability of water, quality of soil & and timing of sowing.

28 farmers have been given earthworm for making vermicompost pits as guided by local agriculture expert and volunteers. Soil samples of beneficiaries had sent for testing. Mapping of water resources has been done which can develop for micro irrigation.

BOMBAY CITY BRANCH

Bombay City Branch continued with its rural development programs of humanitarian assistance to the villagers despite the labour unrest. The Branch continued to monitor its various rural developments projects, viz. education, health care, sanitation, including construction of toilets, malnutrition and empowerment.

Donation Cards

As in the past years, school donation cards were sent to schools and a sum of Rs.15,939/- was collected for financing its own activities and running the Blood Centre.

Medical Aid:

Rs.2,06,000/- was disbursed to patients suffering from various ailments.

Education:

Under "Power to Write" program Notebooks along with Stationeries were distributed to the schools of Murbad, Kalyan, Moroshi, Shahapur, Kasti, Panvel, Vasai and Chembur at a cost of Rs.1,16,264/-.

Sanitation

For the past six years, Bombay City Branch has also provided toilets and sanitation facilities in the tribal areas. With the Government giving top priority to Sanitation and health care, more importance given to construction of toilets. During the year, 43 toilets were constructed at Towerwadi in collaboration with Khushtarog Nivaran Samiti, at a cost of Rs.10,00,000/-. So far we have constructed more than 210 toilets. The Branch is making all out efforts to raise funds for construction of maximum number of toilets in the villages.

Pune Race

A sum of Rs. 17,510/- was received from the Royal Western Turf Club, Pune. As usual, this fund raising event was organized through the good offices of our Committee Member, Mrs. Chandra Ruia. Money collected was earmarked for rural development projects and the Blood Centre.

The Adams Wylie Memorial Hospital Trust

As per the MOU signed between The Adams Wylie Memorial Trust and the Saifee Hospital, patients are recommended to the Hospital for various tests and investigations, after examined by the Medical Officer of the AWMHT Clinic situated in the Red Cross building. The patients need not to pay even a single rupee. Consolidated monthly bills are settled by the Trust with the Hospital. During the year the Trust paid a sum of Rs.61,57,036/- to the Hospital for this facility for conducting various tests and investigation on indigent and patients from economic weaker section.

Report on the IRCS, Blood Centre for the period of Report on the IRCS, Blood Centre

Blood Collection & Supply

During the period 1st April 2016 to 31st March 2017, 5394 units of blood were collected of which 403 units were collected in house and 4928 units were collected at 112 blood donation camps, 63 units were received from other Hospitals. Of the total blood collection 4% of the blood was discarded due to various reasons and 99% of the blood was processed into components.

Total 34% of blood was issued free.

Post donation Counseling

During the above mentioned period HBV-22, HCV-5 donors were found to be infected for infectious diseases of which 2 donors were counseled for HbsAg and 1 donor for HCV.

Blood Supply to storage Centres

There are nine centres which are registered as storage centre 1495 units of blood, 636 units of fresh frozen plasma and 43 units platelet were issued to them.

Four centres are on contract basis and 359 units of blood, 68 units of FFP and 198 units of RDP, 16 units of Cryoprecipitate were issued to them.

Financial Report

On financial front, during the period 1st April 2016 to 31st March 2017, Rs.59,43,230/was collected as service charges for blood and its components while the expenses aggregated to Rs. 1,74,46,633/- thereby resulting in an overall deficit of Rs.1,15,03,403/- Rs.41,83,024/- was received as donation.

Plasma supplied to Celestial

593.723 litres of fresh frozen plasma and 76.959 litres of CDP amounting Rs.12,43,738/ was given to Celestial Biological for fractionation.

Thalassemia day care centre

At the thalassemia day care centre, 59 children were given 1646 units of blood transfusions, desferal worth Rs.12,120 were given to them. These patients were provided medical advice and counseling by Dr.Naidu.

100 Vials of desferal were donated by our patient Nikhil Vadgama worth Rs.17,000/

Participation at the workshop

Dr.Naidu went as faculty for training of nurses at K.E.M. Hospital on 30th June 2016.

Dr.Naidu went as faculty for training of Laboratory Technicians at Tata Memorial Hospital on 14th July 2016

Dr. Naidu was invited as faculty for ISTM conference which was held at Bhopal on 17th, 18th, 19th November 2016.

Dr.Naidu attended the GAP meeting on 29th, 30th November 2016 at Delhi, IRCS headquarter.

School classes: Pre-primary: First, Second, Third and Fourth grade Middle school – 1st to 7th standards & D.Ed. (HI). Employee: 19 Teaching staff and 24 Non-teaching staff . Total staff: 43

List of equipment in the school:

Audiometer, Speech trainer, Group hearing aids etc. In addition there is a sound proof room, ear mould laboratory, early Intervention Centre, Loop induction system etc.

During the year 100 plants were planted in their school premises by the students of the school.

On 15th August 2016, additional 200 plants were planted in their school premises by the children to celebrate Independence Day.

Disaster Response

During the year a water tanker was purchased with the help of IRCS Maharashtra State Branch and drinking water was supplied to 3 villages for 1 month. 1566 people were benefitted. The IRCS Maharashtra State Branch in 2015-16 had donated Rs.2 lakhs to the Barshi Sub-District to purchase a water tanker.

DROUGHT RELIEF WORK AT VILLAGE KHALAD, TALUKA PURANDAR, DIST. PUNE

Khalad and Ekatpur villages of Purandar Taluka of Pune District, 8 kms from Saswad situated on the banks of the Karha river were severely hit by droughts over the last two years. The villages wanted to solve the problem of irrigation water which arose due to the damage caused to a 50 year old Diversion Bund. With participation of local villages. Sevavardhini, a dedicated social organization undertook repair of the Diversion Bund with reconstruction the of wall in the river bed. The project is expected to benefit about 400 farmers by supplying water for over 1200 acres of farmland. The cost of construction of the bund was Rs.13.23 lacs. To support the cause Indian Red Cross Society, Pune Dist. Br. provided Rs.500,000/-(Rupees Five Lacs) from the Disaster Relief Fund for the project.

18th August 2016

Rakshabandhan programme was celebrated for wounded soldiers at Military Hospital, Khadki, Pune by Red Cross Youths from Abasaheb GArware College, Karve Road. The female students tied rakhis to the inmates of the hospital.

August 2016 :Counselor's training:

1 day JRC/YRC counselors' training program was held on 21st August at Abasaheb Garware College, Karve Road, Pune which was attended by 65 Counselors .

The program was inaugurated by Dr. Mrs. Muktaja Matakari, Principal of Abasaheb Garwere College, who gave a speech on the subject of 'Role of youths in Social Problems'. Prof. R.V.Kulkarni enlightened the participants on school safety program for ensuring safety of students and staff. Prof. Kiran Khajekar spoke on Red Cross Movement, Fundamental principles and JRC/YRC., roles and responsibility of counselors and JRC/YRC principles. JRC activities in educational institutions were discussed and a plan of action for 2016-17 was discussed by the counselors.

25TH AUGUST 2016.

The Youth Red Cross Unit of Abasaheb Garware College, Karve road Pune-4 had organised RIVER CLEANING activity on 25th august 2016.

The river Mutha flowing at the back of the College usually get flooded in the rainy season. All the plastic and other non biodegradable waste that has been flown down with the rain water gets entangled on the fringe of the river compound. As the water resides it clings on the fence and gives a very shabby appearance to the entire area.

Thirty five volunteers of Youth Red Cross Unit actively participated in the river cleaning activity. Boys and girls of F.Y and S.Y class actively participated and we were able to collect 40 gunny bags of waste. The waste was segregated into biodegradable and non biodegradable. Various questions were answered by Mr. Varad Pathak who works with Lokayat. The session was interactive with full participation of the students.

WASH COMMUNITY: FIRST AID TRAINING

WASH is a Water, Sanitatiion and Hygiene Project undertaken by Pune District Branch under a special scheme of Maharashtra State Branch and funded by International Committee of Red Cross through National Red Cross Head Quarters.

He was a true adventurist, passionate about trekking and inculcated adventure in hundreds of youngsters. In May 2012 at the age of 92 yrs he completed Sandakphu Trek near Darjeeling at 12000 ft height. He also completed Kalsubai Trek the same year.

Mr. Mahajan was the Founder of Pune District Boxing Association , President of Maharashtra Hockey Federation and Asst. Dist. Commissioner of Scouts .

Mr.N.K.Mahajan has been a recipient of many Awards including Sharda Vidyapeetth Rushitulya Puraskar, Scout Seva Puraskar, Best Civil Defence Commandant Award, International Longivity Centre Award, Giripremi Jeevan Gaurav Puraskar etc. to name a few.

Mr. N.K.Mahajan will always be remembered as an ardent social worker, sportsman, trekker, mountaineer, adventurist, a true Scout and a humanist with a voluntary spirit. He followed JRC & Red Cross Principles in his life."

SOLAPUR DISTRICT BRANCH

The Branch has collected 15586 units of blood inspite of tough competition from other old and new blood banks which have come up during last 2-3 years.

This was possible due to cooperation of various social organisations and industrial and educational instituies. For last so many years these organisations and institutes are helping The Branch immensely in voluntary blood donation motivation programmes. We are grateful to all these social organisations industrial units and educational institutes who are loyal to our blood bank. The credit also goes to our blood bank staff who have worked hard against many odds. We thank all of them and I am sure, in future also we will get their cooperation.

The blood bank is passing through a difficult phase financially. Besause many new blood banks have come up and some of them having commercial attitude it has become necessary to market the blood & blood components. Necessary steps are being taken to do the same. The branch is reducing expenses to a great extent, whenever possible.

VOLUNTARY DONATION:

It has been noted that many of the social organisations arrange a large voluntary blood donation camp only once in a year. It is our sincerest request that the big educational institutions and social organisations should take initiative in providing two or three camps in a year - as a result of which, number of donors will increase and there will be sustained supply of blood throughout the year.

Ninety percent of the blood collection is through blood donation camps. The Branch feels that voluntary blood donors should donate blood 2 or 3 times every year at the blood bank premises. Such donations should constitute 50% of the yearly collection.

From the statistical data it is observed that the blood collection has dropped by about 563 units compared to previous year. This is due to 2-3 new blood banks which have started functioning in Solapur.

Recently it is observed that some unethical practices are observed in voluntary blood donation activity. Some blood banks are trying to lure voluntary blood donors by using unethical means. This is against the essence of voluntary blood donation.

14th June 2017 "World Blood Donors Day" :-

Thalassemia Centre and Haemophilia Centre:-

This is a unique activity of the blood bank. 120 children receive regular blood transfusions throughout the year FREE OF COST. These children come from surrounding districts of Maharashtra, and Karnataka. During the year, we had given 2007 units of Packed Red Cells to thalassemics and 178 units of Fresh Frozen Plasma for Haemophiliacs.

We have been running thalassemia center since 1987. Last year we transfused 130 thalassemia children 3000 units of blood free of cost. This also puts a burden on our finances to the tune of Rs. 25 lacs per year. This is a unique activity of Damani Blood Bank in Solapur district. We request various charitable organisations and individules to Donate Rs. 20000/- and adopt one child for year. Smaller donations are also solicited to help run our thalassemia center.

INDIAN RED CROSS SOCIETY, MAHARASHTRA STATE BRANCH, Dr.RUSTOMJI B. BILLIMORIA BEL-AIR HOSPITAL, PANCHGANI, REPORT 2016-17

1. Bel-Air Hospital

Established in 1912 in Pune, Bel-Air was shifted to the 44 acre verdurous campus in Panchgani donated by Sir Dorabji Tata in 1914. Its dry and bracing climate being ideal for the recovery of TB patients has been one of the premier TB hospitals in India. Dr.Rustomji Billimoria founder of Bel-Air was the recipient of the first gold medal of the Anti-TB Association of India and Padma Bhushan. In 1964 Bel-Air exceeded its anti-TB targets set by the Government of India by 400%.

Bel-Air has healed thousands of TB patients at a time when TB was considered incurable and had no medicine. Most of the patients were poor and were treated free. Bel-Air faced extra ordinary challenges right from the beginning. However it catapulted itself to be one the finest in the country. Visits of celebrities became a regular feature and it became customary for every State Governor as well as the Chief Ministers, to pay a visit to Bel-Air, which occasioned the opening of a new facility or block.

For several decades it was run as a private trust medical institution, but in 1964, to ensure its continuity, the founder transferred the management of the hospital and sanatorium to the Indian Red Cross Society, Maharashtra State Branch and since then it has been a Red Cross project.

But by 1970s with the discovery of Anti TB drugs and the consequent shift to domiciliary treatment for TB rather than Sanatorium model, coupled with dwindling donations, and lack of proper staff and efficient management, Bel-Air passed through very bad days. By 1993 almost all the 58 buildings had been dilapidated. There wasn't any trained medical staff, the number of patients had dipped to below thirty. Accumulated deficit was running into lakhs of rupees. Labour unrest was creating lot of problems. And even the land was being encroached upon. Bel-Air was almost on the verge of a closure.

Resurrection of Bel-Air

The revamping and resurrection of Bel-Air is an exciting story of human spirit. The revival phase of the Hospital started after 1994 when Red Cross entrusted the management and administration of Bel-Air to MCBS (Missionary Congregation of the Blessed Sacrament).

The initial revival phase was painful and traumatic. Lack of funds was just one element, there were much serious problems like labour unrest and militancy. There were some influential political forces and rich land sharks who had set their eyes on the vast property in the hill station town. They had conspired to close down the hospital at the time of crisis and take over the land to make it a resort. During the troubled times from 1994 to 2002, then Governor of Maharashtra, Dr. P.C. Alexander's patronage was invaluable.

The new management took strong steps to overcome the crisis and Bel-Air emerged out like a phoenix with its reputation soaring higher. Over the years, Bel-Air Sanatorium enlarged its mission from TB to address the challenges of an unfolding disaster relating to HIV/AIDS. Since 1995 Bel-Air began to administer to HIV/AIDS patients when hospitals refused to admit them, government gave no support and Anti-Retroviral Therapy (ART) was not available. Families abandoned patients, no operations were performed on them and dead bodies were not even claimed due to the high level of stigma and discrimination.

Bel-Air played a leading role in introducing HIV/AIDS care and treatment in India. The visit of the President of India, Dr.A.P.J. Abdul Kalam to Bel-Air in 2003 was a turning point when he instructed the then Director General of NACO Mr. S. Y. Quereshi IAS, to involve Bel-Air into the National AIDS Control Program. Thus Fr. Tomy K MCBS, Director, Bel-Air Hospital was first appointed as the Civil Society representative to CCM(Country Coordinating Mechanism) of UN-GFATM (Global Fund for AIDS, TB and Malaria) and later as the Chairperson of TRG(Technical Resource Group) for Community Care Centres in NACO for 2 terms.

Bel-Air Hospital was awarded the Times of India Healthcare Achievers Award 2014 in the category of "Innovation in managing long term condition" on 11th December 2014. Healthcare Achievers Awards 2014, an initiative by The Times of India and New India Assurance Co. is to celebrate achievements and recognize those healthcare providers who have raised the bar in healthcare with their dynamic spirit and innovative outlook.

Today this 240 bedded hospital is both a general hospital as well as an HIV treatment centre, while TB continues to be the focus. Bel-Air is a major NGO partner with the Governments of Maharashtra and India in the implementation of Revised National TB Control Programme (RNTCP).

1. DEPARTMENT OF TUBERCULOSIS

TB is coming back with a vengeance and it continues to be the number one killer disease in India. It has an added dimension of co-infection with HIV now. Hence in the resurgence of Bel-Air, the focus on TB work is not lost. Bel-Air continues to run a DOTs Centre, a Microscopy Centre and a TB Unit for Mahableshwar Taluka. Apart from collaborating with the RNTCP programme, in-house treatment facilities for sputum positive patients is also provided. Most of the patients being very poor, they are given free or concessional treatment for indoor care, funds permitting. The excellent work done by the staff has earned Bel-Air TB Unit the top spot among TB Units in the District. During the period 2016-17 the TB Unit has conducted sputum tests for 1631 and identified 116 sputum positive patients, of which 60 were new sputum positive patients, 34 were new sputum negative patients, 25 were extra pulmonary patients, 42 patients were put on re-treatment. All were initiated to DOTS and total of 161 TB patients were on treatment during the year.

2. DEPARTMENTOF HIV/AIDS

Bel-Air is one of the premier institutes of treatment, care, support and training in HIV/ AIDS in India. Patients admitted in Bel-Air are treated for Opportunistic Infections and initiated on Anti Retroviral Therapy (ART) and are then referred to Government ART centres which is nearest to their place of residence. Patients come to Bel-Air from most of the districts of Maharashtra and north Karnataka. Of the 240 beds in the hospital more than 100 beds are usually occupied by HIV infected patients. Most of the patients admitted are from very poor background, are in advanced stage of AIDS. Most of the patients are provided treatment on concessional basis.

HIV/AIDS Continuum of Care Programs

Bel-Air has become an important partner of the District ART Center in ensuring adherence among patients on ART. The social workers in the hospital in coordination with the ART Center regularly follow up patients who have defaulted on ART and help the patient to adhere to the required medication. Bel-Air conducts regular outreach activities and home visits of HIV/AIDS patients.

30 bedded Tertiary Treatment Center for acutely sick HIV/AIDS patients at Bel-Air Hospital funded by Sir Dorabji Tata Trust

In 2014 Sir Dorabji Tata Trust had sanctioned a three year grant for a 30 bedded tertiary treatment center for poor acutely sick HIV/AIDS patients.

During the period from 1st April 2016 to 31st March 2017, the project admitted 446 acutely sick patients of which 429 have recovered fully and have gone back to their families. However 17 patients who had been admitted at an acute stage expired .

World AIDS Day

World AIDS Day was observed on 1st December 2016. An exhibition on HIV/AIDS was organsied at Shivajil Chowk,Panchgani by The staff and MSc Nursing students of Bel-Air Hospital and College of Nursing. Mrs. Laxmi Karadkar (President: Panchgani Hill Station Municipal Council) along with Fr. Tomy K (Director: Bel – Air Institution) and Sr. Lourdu M. Nagothu (Principal: Bel – Air College of Nursing & Nursing Director: Bel – Air Hospital) inaugurated the exhibition. Besides this the following programs were also conducted on the day.

- A. A rangoli competition was held for the patients and relatives on campus of Bel-Air Hospital with theme, "Hands up for HIV prevention".
- B A quiz competition on HIV/AIDS was conducted for the staff of Bel-Air Hospital and staff and students of Bel-Air College of Nursing.

3. THE GENERAL HOSPITAL WING

The Hospital has full fledged departments of general medicine, gynaecology, orthopaedics, general surgery etc., with full time Resident Consultants which are also meant for the residents of Mahableshwar Taluka where there is no other standard medical facility. The Hospital has a well-equipped I.C.U., a state of the art operation theatre with laparoscopic systems and C-Arm and modern diagnostic facilities like X-ray and E.C.G. There is a well equipped Laboratory which is an important back-up for medical services. Weekly clinics is available for Ophthalmology. All festivals are celebrated with great fervour by decorating the wards and hospital premises especially for Ganesh Chathurthi, Diwali and Christmas etc.

4. Village Health and Development Project In the rural areas of Mahabaleshwar Taluka, Satara District funded by Breach Candy Hospital Trust, Mumbai

Breach Candy Hospital sanctioned a grant in 2015 for a comprehensive village health and development program in the hilly areas of Mahabeleshwar Taluka of Satara District. During the year 2016-17 the following activities were conducted:-

II. INDIAN RED CROSS SOCIETY, MAHARASHTRA STATE, BRANCH, BEL-AIR COLLEGE OF NURSING

Indian Red Cross Society established Bel-Air College of Nursing in 2006. The main objective of the college was the enhancement of content and quality of Nursing Education in India to strengthen the national response to the emerging challenges in the health care sector, through the pursuit of capacity building of nurses. It is the first nursing programme in India with a focus on HIV/AIDS and in collaboration with an American University, University of Illinois at Chicago. This collaboration came about with the help of Prof. Minu Patel - Professor Emeritus UIC-CON, and Dr. Mehroo Patel who had earlier worked with the founder's son Dr. Bomi Billimoria. The College was also permitted to start the M.Sc. course 2014.

1. Maharashtra University of Health Science Programs

The new academic session for 2016-17 commenced with 40 students in the tenth batch from 1st August 2016 in addition to the already existing 113 students from the previous 3 batches.

Bel-Air College of Nursing was sanctioned 8 M.Sc. seats (Medical Surgical Nursing with subspecialty of HIV/AIDS – the first of its kind in India) in 2016-17. Presently 4

students admitted in 2016-17 are undergoing their first year of M.SC. program. Five students admitted in 2014-15 have completed their second year of the M.Sc. Program and have appeared for their University Examinations.

Clinical Practice

First year B.Sc. students were posted for their clinical practice to Bel-Air Hospital from 9th December 16 to 29th April 2017. The 2nd year students were posted for their clinical practice from 4th Jan 2017 to 26th March 2017 at Satara Hospital and 3rd year B.Sc. students were posted to Krishna Hospital, Karad for their clinical practice from 29th Jan 2017 to 31st March 2017.

The 4th year B.Sc. students were sent for their community posting from 17th October to 12th November 2016 to Ahir Mura, Mahableshwar. For their internship they were posted to Breach Candy Hospital from 28th November to 31st December 16.They were then posted to Bel-Air Hospital from 1st January to 24th February 2017 which was followed by an internship on obstetrics & Gynec at Krishna Hospital, Karad from 27th Feb 2017 to 25th March 2017.

4. ANM Program

Bel-Air College of Nursing established a school for Revised Auxiliary Nursing & Midwifery (RANM) training programme in 2009 with funding support from Johnson & Johnson. An ANM plays a vital role in the rural healthcare delivery system. As a qualified ANM, she will be able to provide accessible, equitable, affordable and quality healthcare, acting as a catalyst for promoting inter-sectoral convergence in promotive and preventive healthcare. This will also enhance the economic and social status of girls in rural parts of Maharashtra.

ANM admission for eighth batch - 2016: The College of Nursing published advertisements across Maharashtra on May 26, 2016 in Tarun Bharat & Punyanagari Newspaper inviting application from suitable candidates for the ANM course. A total of 92 applications were received. Interview was held on July 7,

2016. Of the 92 applicants 30 were selected on the basis of selection criteria laid down. Classes for the fresh batch commenced from September 13th, 2016 and for the already existing 30 students of the previous batch, classes commenced from July, 2016. Each student was provided with 2 sets of uniforms, required text books & note books and stationery.

Examinations: The seventh batch of ANM students appeared for their first year theory examination from June 27 to 30, 2016 and practical examinations on 5th & 6th July, 2016. The 6th batch of RANM students appeared for 2nd year examination on 27th to 28th July, 2016 and practical examinations on 5th July 2016.

Clinical Practice: **The 1st year ANM students** were posted to Bel-Air Hospital for clinical experience from 21st September 2016 to 2nd April 2017. During the posting they completed fundamentals of nursing procedures and care plans. The students were also posted to the villages in Mahabaleshwar Taluka to conduct survey.

Of the 30 students who appeared for their final 2nd Year examination, 7 were posted for their internship from 12th September 2016 to 2nd April 2017 to Bel-Air Hospital, 8 to Pooja Nursing Home, Koregaon, 4 to Modern clinic, Wai, 6 to Primary Health Center at Tapola/Taldev, 2 were posted at JMJ hospital Goa and 3 were sent to JMJ Hospital, Bangalore.

5. Co curricular activities:

Indradhanush

27 Students from Bel-Air College of Nursing participated in Indradhanush a Cultural Competition organized by Maharashtra University of Health Sciences, Nashik (MUHS) from 18th & 19th October 2016. During the event 10 Students from Bel-Air secured first positions in 6 competitions including Indian group song, classical vocal solo, light vocal solo, western group song, western vocal solo & cartooning. All 10 were selected to represent MUHS for the Inter University Competition. Mr. Stephen Michal, a faculty in Bel-Air College of Nursing was appointed as the Team Manager for the MUHS team.

1. Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying Consolidated financial statements of Indian Red Cross Society, Maharashtra State Branch ("the Trust"), which comprise the Balance Sheet as at March 31, 2017 and the Income and Expenditure Account for the year then ended, and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

2. Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

The management of the trust is responsible for the preparation of these financial statements that give a true and fair view of the financial position and financial performance of the Trust. This responsibility includes maintenance of adequate accounting records in accordance with the provisions of the Maharashtra Public Trusts Act, 1950 (the Act) for safeguarding the assets of the Trust and for preventing and detecting frauds and other irregularities; selection and application of appropriate accounting policies; making judgement and estimates that are reasonable and prudent; design, implementation and maintenance of adequate internal internal financial controls, that are operating effectively for ensuring the accuracy and completeness of the accounting records, relevant to the preparation and presentation of the financial statements that give a true and fair view and are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

3. Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. We have taken into account the provisions of the Act, the accounting and auditing standards and matters which are required to be included in the audit report under the provisions of the Act and Rules made thereunder. We conducted our audit in accordance with the Standards on Auditing issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India. Those Standards require that we comply with ethical requirements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedure to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgement, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal financial control relevant to the Trust's preparation of the financial statements, that give a true and fair view, in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion whether the Trust has in place an adequate internal financial controls. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of the accounting estimates made by the Trust's management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

4. Opinion

In our opinion and to the best of our information and according to the explanations given to us, the aforesaid financial statements give the information required by the Act in the manner so required and give a true and fair view in conformity with the accounting principles generally accepted in India :

- i) in the case of the Balance Sheet, of the state of affairs of the Trust as at March 31, 2017;
- ii) in case of the Income and Expenditure Account, of the excess of income over expenditure for the year ended on that date;
- 5. In exercise of powers conferred by the first provision to sub-section (4) of Section I of Maharashtra Public Trust Act, 1950 the Government of Maharashtra have vide notification no. BPT/1390/350(81)-VI, published in the Official Gazette dated March 19, 1992 directed that the Indian Red Cross Society, Maharashtra State Branch and its branches situated in the State of Maharashtra registered as a

Public Trust under the said Act, shall with effect from the date of publication of the said Notification in the Official Gazette be exemptd from all provisions of the said Act, except for those relating to the registration contained in the Chapter IV of the said Act. Accordingly, the Act and Rules framed under Chapter V of the The Bombay Public Trust Act, 1950 is not applicable to the Trust and hence this report is not in pursuance of Rule 19 of The Maharashtra Public Trust Rules, 1951.

- 6. Further to our comments in paragraph 6 above, we report that :
 - i) we have sought and obtained all the information and explanations which to the best of our knowledge and belief were necessary for the purpose of our audit;
 - ii) in our opinion proper books of account as required by law have been kept by the Trust so far as appears from our examination of those books;
 - iii) The Balance Sheet and Income and Expenditure Account dealt with by this report are in agreement with the books of accounts and are prepared in accordance with the accounting standards, as applicable, issued by The Institute of Chartered Accountants of India.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements for financial year ended 31st March 2017

1. Background and Nature of Operations of the Trust

Indian Red Cross Society (IRCS) is a statutory body established under an Act of Parliament (Act No. VX of 1920). The Maharashtra State Branch IRCS ('the Trust") is registered as a trust under the Maharashtra Public Trusts Acts, 1950 ('the act') The Government of Maharashtra has vide notification No. BPT/1390/350(81)-VI, published in the official Gazette dated March 19,1992 exempted the Trust from all the provisions of the Act except Chapter IV relating to registration.

The Indian Red Cross Society (IRCS) is a national federation with more than 650 IRCS branches, It acts as an auxiliary to the government in providing medical aid and relief in times of calamities without favour of caste and creed and provides services in healthcare and social welfare programs. The Trust is also responsible for coordinating the activities of various Red Cross branches in Maharashtra.

2. Statement of Significant Accounting Policies

a) Basis of preparation

As explained in para I above, the Trust is exempted from the provisions of the Bombay Public Trust Act. Accordingly these consolidated financials statements have been prepared based on the Technical Guide on Accounting and Auditing in Not-for-Profit Organisations issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India ('ICAI").

The consolidated financial statements (CFS) have been prepared to comply in all material respects with the mandatory Accounting Standards issued by the ICAI. The CFS have been prepared under the historical cost convention on an accrual basis. The accounting policies have been consistently applied by the Trust and are consistent with those used in the previous year.

Principles of consolidation

The financial statements consolidate the financial results of Maharashtra State Branch of the Indian Red Cross Society, Staff Provident Fund, Bel-Air Sanatorium and Bel Air College of Nursing & Junior Red Cross Sub- Committee.

The financial statements of all the above units have been combined on a line-byline basis by adding together the value of like items of assets, liabilities, income and expenses after eliminating inter-unit balances.

Based on Rules 5 (j) and 5 (k) which define the powers of district branches, composition or operations (in any form) of all district level branches are not controlled by the State General Committee of the Maharashtra State Branch. Therefore all district level branches are excluded from consolidation in the aforesaid financial statements.

b) Classification of Donations received

i) Unrestricted Funds / General Donations :

These funds are used in accordance with the objects of the Society, at the discretion of the trustees / members of the governing body.

ii) Designated Funds :

These funds are set aside by the trustees / members of the governing body out of unrestricted funds for specific future purpose or projects.

iii) Restricted / Endowment Funds:

Restricted funds can only be used for particular purposes within the objects of the Society, Restrictions arise when stipulated by the donor or under a law. Endowment funds are a form of restricted funds that are received with a stipulation from the donor that the amount received should not be used for any purpose; only the income earned from these funds can be used for general or specific purpose in accordance with the terms of contribution.

c) Fixed Assets

Fixed assets are stated at cost, less grants received, accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. Cost comprises the purchase price, value of donations received in kind and any attributable cost of bringing the asset to its working condition for its intended use.

d) Depreciation

Depreciation is provided on written Down Value method at the rates prescribed in Income Tax Act, 1961.

e) Investments

All the Investments are considered as Long term and are accounted for at cost of acquisition. Provision is made if the dimination in value of investment is not considered temporary.

f) Government grants and subsidies

Grants and subsidies from the government/ others are generally recognized when there is reasonable assurance that the grant/subsidy will be received and all attaching conditions will be complied with. When the grant or subsidy relates to an expense item, it is recognized as income over the periods necessary to match it on a systematic basis to the costs which it is intended to compensate. Where the grant or subsidy relates to an asset, it is treated as deferred income, which is recognized in the income statement on a systematic and rational basis over the useful life of the asset.

Donations are accounted for on receipt basis.

g) Income Recognition

Interest income is recognised on a time proportion basis taking into account the amount outstanding and the rate applicable.

Dividend income is recognised when the holders' right to receive payment is established by the balance sheet date.

Income earned on letting out hall on hire is recognised on accrual basis.

Lease income is recognised on a straight line basis for the period of the lease Income in the nature of tuition fees received from students for an academic year is recognized when there is a reasonable certainty of its realization / ultimate collection. As the academic year is from June to March, the fees received are treated as income over that period. Income from college activities is recognized when there is a reasonable certainly of its realization / ultimate collection.

All other sources of income like contribution and subscription, from City Branch/ districts of the Indian Red Cross Society, etc. are accounted for receipt basis.

h) Retirement Benefits

Retirement benefits in the form of Provident Fund are charged to the Income & Expenditure Account of the year when the contributions to the respective funds are due. Gratuity liability under the Payment of Gratuity act is accrued and provided for on the basis of an actuarial valuation made at the end of each financial year.

i) Provisions

A provision is recognised when the trust has a present obligation as a result of past events; where it is probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation and in respect of which a reliable estimate can be made. Provisions are not discounted to their present values and are determined based on best estimate required to settle the obligation at the balance sheet date. Provision for expenditure relating to voluntary retirement is made when the employee accepts the offer of early retirement.

j) Inventory

Inventory of medicines and consumables are valued at lower of cost and net realizable value. Cost includes purchase cost and other incidental charges.

3. Income Taxes

Returns of income under the Income Tax Act, 1961 are being filed for the Consolidated Accounts of Maharashtra State Branch. The Chief Commissioner of Income Tax, Mumbai has granted approval U/s 10(23C)(via) of the Income Tax Act, 1961 to the Indian Red Cross Society (Maharashtra State Branch) vide order dated 28.01.2010 and the approval is valid from Ass. Yr. 2009 - 10 and onwards until withdrawn.

4. Details pertaining to certain fixed assets like itemized breakup of Furniture and Fixtures, Electrical Installation, Medical Apparatus, Office Equipment and Computers are not available with the trust. The Gross Block in respect of

these assets aggregates to Rs. 4,63,97,943/- and the Net Block aggregates to Rs. 1,70,58,542/-.

5. Based on the nature of records maintained by the Trust, it is not possible to correlate the designated/ endowments funds with the investments made, consequently the information has not been provided. Further, there is no accretion to the endowment funds by way of interest earned on the investments.

6. Contingencies

There is an appeal by Bel-Air Sanatorium pending in the High Court against the order of the Industrial Court. In accordance with the order of the Industrial Court, the unit is required to reinstate six dismissed employees with full back wages. The Management has obtained a stay of the operation of this order from the High Court, and is of the view that the liability is not probable in this case. Pending final resolution of this matter, no provision have been made for the estimated liability of Rs. 24,78,601/- for back wages of the dismissed employees.

7. The future minimum lease payment in respect of trust property given on lease to Missionary Congregation of the Blessed Sacrament (MCBS) for running a school for a term of 30 years commencing October 2003 are as follows :

1. Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Indian Red Cross Society, Maharashtra State Branch ("the Trust"), which comprise the Balance Sheet as at March 31, 2017 and the Income and Expenditure Account for the year then ended, and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

2. Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

The management of the trust is responsible for the preparation of these financial statements that give a true and fair view of the financial position and financial performance of the Trust. This responsibility includes maintenance of adequate accounting records in accordance with the provisions of the Maharashtra Public Trusts Act, 1950 (the Act) for safeguarding the assets of the Trust and for preventing and detecting frauds and other irregularities; selection and application of appropriate accounting policies; making judgement and estimates that are reasonable and prudent; design, implementation and maintenance of adequate internal internal financial controls, that are operating effectively for ensuring the accuracy and completeness of the accounting records, relevant to the preparation and presentation of the financial statements that give a true and fair view and are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

3. Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. We have taken into account the provisions of the Act, the accounting and auditing standards and matters which are required to be included in the audit report under the provisions of the Act and Rules made thereunder. We conducted our audit in accordance with the Standards on Auditing issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India. Those Standards require that we comply with ethical requirements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

BPT/1390/350(81)-VI, published in the Official Gazette dated March 19, 1992 directed that the Indian Red Cross Society, Maharashtra State Branch and its branches situated in the State of Maharashtra registered as a

Public Trust under the said Act, shall with effect from the date of publication of the said Notification in the Official Gazette be exemptd from all provisions of the said Act, except for those relating to the registration contained in the Chapter IV of the said Act. Accordingly, the Act and Rules framed under Chapter V of the The Maharashtra Public Trust Act, 1950 is not applicable to the Trust and hence this report is not in pursuance of Rule 19 of The Maharashtra Public Trust Rules, 1951.

- 6. Further to our comments in paragraph 5 above, we report that :
 - we have sought and obtained all the information and explanations which to the best of our knowledge and belief were necessary for the purpose of our audit;
 - ii) in our opinion proper books of account as required by law have been kept by the unit so far as appears from our examination of those books;
 - iii) The Balance Sheet and Income and Expenditure Account dealt with by this report are in agreement with the books of accounts and are prepared in accordance with the accounting standards, as applicable, issued by The Institute of Chartered Accountants of India.

1. Background and Nature of Operations

Indian Red Cross Society (IRCS) is a statutory body established under an Act of Parliament (Act No. VX of 1920). The Maharashtra State Branch IRCS ('the Trust'') is registered as trust under the Maharashtra Public Trusts Acts, 1950 ('the act') The Government of Maharashtra has vide notification No. BPT/1390/350(81)-VI, published in the official Gazette dated March 19,1992 exempted the Trust from all the provisions of the Act except Chapter IV relating to registration.

The Indian Red Cross Society (IRCS) is a national federation with more than 650 IRCS branches, It acts as an auxiliary to the government in providing medical aid and relief in times of calamities without favour of caste and creed and provides services in healthcare and social welfare programs. The Trust is also responsible for coordinating the activities of various Red Cross branches in Maharashtra.

These financial statements pertain to the results of the Mumbai Headquarters of Maharashtra State Branch of the Indian Red Cross Society. They do not include the financial results of Bel-Air Sanatorium (Hospital Unit), Bel-Air College of Nursing, Staff Provident Fund and Junior Red Cross Sub-Committee, which are also part of Maharashtra State Branch of the Indian Red Cross Society.

2. Statement of Significant Accounting Policies

a) Basis of preparation

As explained in para I above, the Trust is exempted from the provisions of the Bombay Public Trust Act. Accordingly these financials statements have been prepared based on the Technical Guide on Accounting and Auditing in Not-for-Profit Organisations issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India ('ICAI")

The financial statements have been prepared to comply in all material respects with the mandatory Accounting Standards issued by the ICAI. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention on an accrual basis. The accounting policies have been

consistently applied by the Trust and are consistent with those used in the previous year.

b) Classification of Donations received

 Unrestricted funds / General Donations : These funds are used in accordance with the objects of the Society, at the discretion of the trustees / members of the governing body.

ii) Designated Funds :

These funds are set aside by the trustees / members of the governing body out of unrestricted funds for specific future purpose or projects.

iii) Restricted / Endowment Funds:

Restricted funds can only be used for particular purposes within the objects of the Society, Restrictions arise when stipulated by the donor or under a law. Endowment funds are a form of restricted funds that are received with a stipulation from the donor that the amount received should not be used for any purpose; only the income earned from these funds can be used for general or specific purpose in accordance with the terms of contribution.

c) Fixed Assets

Fixed assets are stated at cost, including grants received (if any), less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. Cost comprises the purchase price, fair value of donations received in kind and any attributable cost of bringing the asset to its working condition for its intended use.

d) Depreciation

Depreciation is provided on written Down Value method at the rates prescribed in Income Tax Act, 1961.

e) Investments

All the Investments are considered as Long term and are accounted for at cost of acquisition. Provision is made if the dimination in value of investment is not considered temporary.

f) Government grants and subsidies

Grants and subsidies from the government/ others are generally recognized when there is reasonable assurance that a grant/subsidy will be received and all attaching conditions will be complied with. When the grant or subsidy relates to an expense item, it is recognized as income over the periods necessary to match it on a systematic basis to the costs which it is intended to compensate. Where a grant or subsidy relates to an asset, it is treated as deferred income, which is recognized in the income statement on a systematic and rational basis over the useful life of the asset.

Donations are accounted for on receipt basis.

g) Income Recognition

Interest income is recognised on a time proportion basis taking into account the amount outstanding and the rate applicable.

Dividend income is recognised when the holders' right to receive payment is established by the balance sheet date.

All other sources of income like contribution and subscription, from City Branch/districts of the Indian Red Cross Society, etc. are accounted for on receipt basis.

Income earned on letting out the hall on hire is recognised on accrual basis.

h) Retirement Benefits

Retirement benefits in the form of Provident Fund are charged to the Profit & Loss Account of the year when the contributions to the respective funds are due. Gratuity liability under the Payment of Gratuity act is accrued and provided for on the basis of an actuarial valuation made at the end of each financial year.

i) Provisions

A provision is recognised when an enterprise has a present obligation as a result of past events; where it is probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation and in respect of which a reliable estimate

can be made. Provisions are not discounted to their present value and are determined based on best estimate required to settle the obligation at the balance sheet date. These are reviewed at each balance sheet date and adjusted to reflect the current best estimates.

3. Income Taxes

Returns of income under the Income Tax Act, 1961 are being filed for the Consolidated Accounts of Maharashtra State Branch. The Chief Commissioner of Income Tax, Mumbai has granted approval U/s 10(23C)(via) of the Income Tax Act, 1961 to the Indian Red Cross Society (Maharashtra State Branch) vide order dated 28.01.2010 and the approval is valid from Ass. Yr. 2009 - 10 and onwards until withdrawn.

- 4. a) Administration charges recovery of Rs.9,12,430/- from Mumbai Disaster Relief account being interest on investments and Bank deposits. This is based on a resolution passed by the managing committee.
 - b) During the year Rs. 10,00,000/- is shown as administration charges recovery from CSR contribution made by Breach Candy Hospital Trust.
- 5. Based on the nature of records maintained by the Trust, it is not possible to correlate the designated / endowment funds with the investments held, consequently the information has not been provided in some cases.

6. Comparatives

Previous year figures have been regrouped or reclassified to confirm to the current year's presentation.

Schedule O – Notes to Accounts

1. Background and Nature of Operations

Bel - Air Sanatorium is a constituent unit of Maharashtra State Branch of the Indian Red Cross Society (IRCS). The Indian Red Cross Society (IRCS) is a statutory body established under an Act of Parliament (Act No. VX of 1920).

The Maharashtra State Branch of the IRCS ("the trust') is registered as a trust under the Maharashtra Public Trust Act, 1950 ('the Act'). The Government of Maharashtra has vide notification No.BPT/1390/350(81)-VI, published in the official gazette dated March 19, 1992, exempted the trust from all the provision of the Act except Chapter IV relating to registration.

The original mission of Bel - Air Sanatorium was to provide rehabilitation to tuberculosis patients. Presently it has restructured its facilities to cater not only to tuberculosis patients but also to provide support to PLWHIV/AIDS. This project (Community Care Centre) is funded by a grant from Maharashtra State Aids Control Society. Additionally it also conducts a Care and Support Project, which is supported by Avert Society. These financials do not include the financial results of the nursing college which is also part of the Bel - Air Sanatorium.

2. Statement of Significant Accounting Policies

a) Basis of Preparation:

As explained in Para 1 above, the trust is exempted from all the provisions of the Act, accordingly these financials are prepared based on the Technical Guide on Accounting and Auditing in Non-for-Profit Organizations issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India ("ICAI").

These financial statements have been prepared to comply in all material respects with the mandatory Accounting Standards issued by the ICAI. These financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention on an accrual basis. The accounting policies have been consistently applied by the Trust and are consistent with those used in the previous year.

b) Fixed Assets:

Fixed Assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. Cost comprises the purchase price and any attributable cost of bringing the asset to its working condition for its intended use.

c) Depreciation:

Depreciation is provided on Written down Value Method at the rates prescribed in Income Tax Act, 1961.

d) Investments:

All the Investments are considered as Long term and are accounted for at cost of acquisition. Provision is made if the diminution in value of investment is not considered temporary.

e) Retirement Benefits:

The cost of retirement benefits in the form of Provident Fund is charged to Income and Expenditure Account for the year when the contributions to the respective funds are due. Gratuity liability under the Payment of Gratuity Act is accrued and provided for on the basis of an actuarial valuation made at the end of each financial year.

f) Government Grants and Subsidies :

Grants and subsidies from the government are recognized when there is reasonable assurance that the grant / subsidy will be received and all attaching conditions are complied with. When the grant or subsidy relates to an expenses item, it is recognized as income over the periods necessary to match them on a systematic basis to the costs, which it is intended to compensate. Where the grant or subsidy relates to an asset, it is treated as a deferred income which is recognized in the income statement on a systematic and rational basis over the useful life of the asset.

Donations are accounted for on receipt basis.

g) Income Recognition:

Interest Income is recognized on a time proportion basis taking into account the amount outstanding and the rate applicable.

Dividend Income is recognized when the unit holders' right to receive payment is established by the Balance Sheet Date.

Lease income is recognized on a straight line basis for the period of the lease.

Income from hospital activities is recognized when there is a reasonable certainty of its realization/ ultimate collection.

h) Inventory:

The Trust values the inventory of medicines and consumables at Lower of Cost and net Realizable value. Cost includes purchase cost and other incidental charges.

Net realizable value is the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business. Less estimated costs to make the sale.

i) Provisions:

A provision is recognized when an enterprise has a present obligation as a result of past event; it is probable that an outflow of cash resources will be required to settle the obligation, in respect of which a reliable estimate can be made. Provisions are not discounted to present value and are determined based on best estimate required to settle the obligation at the balance sheet date. These are reviewed at each balance sheet date and adjusted to reflect the current best estimates. Provision for expenditure relating to voluntary retirement is made when the employee accepts the offer of early retirement.

3. Sundry Creditors:

Accounts of certain creditors are subject to reconciliation, pending confirmation of balances and the credit balances in regard to payables have been taken as reflected in the books of accounts and adopted for the purpose of preparation of the Balance Sheet.

- 4. Details pertaining to certain fixed assets like itemized breakup of furniture and fixtures, Electrical installation, Medical apparatus, Office Equipments and Computers are not available with the trust & are subject to reconciliation with physical.
- 5. Based on the nature of records maintained by the Trust, it is not possible to correlate the designated / endowments funds towards the investment made, consequently the information has not been provided. Further, there is no accretion to the endowment funds by way of interest earned on the investment.

6. Operating Leases

The future minimum lease payments in respect of trust property given on lease to Missionary Congregation of the Blessed Sacrament (MCBS) for a term of 30 years commencing October 2003 are as follows:

 Bel - Air Sanatorium (Hospital Unit Account) is a Unit of Indian Red Cross Society, Maharashtra Branch and no separate Return of Income is filed under the Income Tax Act, 1961.

8. Contingencies

- a) There is an appeal by Bel Air Sanatorium pending in the High Court against the order of the Industrial Court. According to the order of the Industrial court, the unit is required to reinstate six dismissed employees with full back wages. The management has obtained a stay of the operation of this order from the High Court, and is of the view that the liability is not probable in this case. Accordingly, pending final resolution of this matter, no provisions has been made for the estimated liability of Rs.24,78,601 for back wages of the dismissed employees.
- b) No Provision is made in the accounts for penal interest and demands that may arise on account of defaults under Chapter XVII-B of the Income Tax Act, 1961, in respect of tax deduction at source as the liability in respect thereof is not ascertainable.

9. Comparatives

Previous year figures have been regrouped or reclassified to confirm to current years presentation.

1. Background and Nature of Operations

The original mission of Bel-Air Nursing to toprovide quality education inthefield of nursing.

2. Statement of Significant Accounting Policies

a) Basis of Preparation

As explained in para 1 above, the Trust is exempted from the provisions of the Act, accordingly these financial statements have been prepared based on the Technical Guide on Accounting and Auditing in Non-for-Profit Organizations issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India ('ICAI').

e) Income Recognition

Income in the nature of tuition fees received from students for an academic year is recognized when there is a reasonable certainty of its realization / ultimate collection. As the college operates from June to May during an academic year, the fees received are not deferred beyond the year end.

f) Provisions

A provision is recognized when an enterprise has a present obligation as a result ofpast event, it is probable that anoutflow of cash resources will be required to settle the obligation, respect of which a reliable estimate can be made. Provisions are notdiscounted to its present value and are determined based on best estimate required to settle the obligation at the balance sheet date. These are reviewed at each balance sheet date and adjusted to reflect the current best estimates. Provision for expenditure relating to voluntary retirement is made when the employee accepts the offer of early retirement.

g) Gratuity:

Pending determination of actuarially computed liability for Gratuity, an ad-hoe provision of Rs.39,000/- for Staff Gratuity has been made during the year on the basis that all eligible staff would retire on the last day of the financial year.

SCHEDULE Q - NOTES TO ACCOUNTS

1. Background and Nature of Operations

Junior Red Cross Sub- Committee is unit of Indian Red Cross Society (IRCS) is a statutory body established under an Act of Parliament (Act No. VX of 1920). The Maharashtra State Branch IRCS ('the Trust") is registered as trust under the Maharashtra Public Trusts Acts, 1950 ('the act') The Government of Maharashtra has vide notification No. BPT/1390/350(81)-VI, published in the official Gazette dated March 19,1992 exempted the Trust from all the provisions of the Act except Chapter IV relating to registration.

Junior Red Cross Sub- Committee carries out numerous activities in the field of health, Social Service, National integration and international understanding.

2. Statement of Significant Accounting Policies

a) Basis of preparation

As explained in para I above, the Trust is exempted from the provisions of the Maharashtra Public Trust Act. Accordingly these financials statements have been prepared based on the Technical Guide on Accounting and Auditing in Not-for-Profit Organisations issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India ('ICAI")

The financial statements have been prepared to comply in all material respects with the mandatory Accounting Standards issued by the ICAI. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention on an accrual basis. The accounting policies have been consistently applied by the Trust and are consistent with those used in the previous year.

b) Classification of Donations received

i) Unrestricted funds / General Donations :

These funds are used in accordance with the objects of the Society, at the discretion of the trustees / members of the governing body.

ii) Designated Funds :

These funds are set aside by the trustees / members of the governing body out of unrestricted funds for specific future purpose or projects.

iii) Restricted / Endowment Funds:

Restricted funds can only be used for particular purposes within the objects of the Society, Restrictions arise when stipulated by the donor or under a law. Endowment funds are a form of restricted funds that are received with a stipulation from the donor that the amount received should not be used for any purpose; only the income earned from these funds can be used for general or specific purpose in accordance with the terms of contribution.

c) Fixed Assets

Fixed assets are stated at cost, including grants received (if any), less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. Cost comprises the purchase price, fair value of donations received in kind and any attributable cost of bringing the asset to its working condition for its intended use.

d) Depreciation

Depreciation is provided on written Down Value method at the rates prescribed in Income Tax Act, 1961.

e) Investments

All the Investments are considered as Long term and are accounted for at cost of acquisition. Provision is made if the dimination in value of investment is not considered temporary.

f) Government grants and subsidies

Grants and subsidies from the government/ others are generally recognized when there is reasonable assurance that a grant/subsidy will be received and all attaching conditions will be complied with. When the grant or subsidy relates to an expense item, it is recognized as income over the periods necessary to match it on a systematic basis to the costs which it is intended to compensate. Where a grant or subsidy relates to an asset, it is treated as deferred income, which is recognized in the income statement on a systematic and rational basis over the useful life of the asset.

Donations are accounted for on receipt basis.

g) Income Recognition

Interest income is recognised on a time proportion basis taking into account the amount outstanding and the rate applicable.

Dividend income is recognised when the holders' right to receive payment is established by the balance sheet date.

All other sources of income like contribution and subscription, from City Branch/ districts of the Indian Red Cross Society, etc. are accounted for on receipt basis.

h) Retirement Benefits

Retirement benefits in the form of Provident Fund are charged to the Profit & Loss Account of the year when the contributions to the respective funds are due. Gratuity liability under the Payment of Gratuity act is accrued and provided for on the basis of an actuarial valuation made at the end of each financial year.

i) Provisions

A provision is recognised when an enterprise has a present obligation as a result of past events; where it is probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation and in respect of which a reliable estimate can be made. Provisions are not discounted to their present value and are determined based on best estimate required to settle the obligation at the balance sheet date. These are reviewed at each balance sheet date and adjusted to reflect the current best estimates.

j) Donation in Kind

Donation in kind has been accounted for at the estimated cost of items. The donation comprises of mostly food items, stationery and has been utilized at the various functions/ camps and events, organized by Junior Red Cross, for which they were received. Thus there is no stock at the end of the year.

3. Income Taxes

Returns of income under the Income Tax Act, 1961 are being filed for the Consolidated Accounts of Maharashtra State Branch. The Chief Commissioner of Income Tax, Mumbai has granted approval U/s 10(23C)(via) of the Income Tax Act, 1961 to the Indian Red Cross Society (Maharashtra State Branch) vide order dated 28.01.2010 and the approval is valid from Ass. Yr. 2009 - 10 and onwards until withdrawn.
