REPORT FOR 2017-18

INTRODUCTION

During 2017-18 in addition to its regular healthcare, dissemination and humanitarian activities, Maharashtra State Branch and its districts continued their activities in a proactive manner in accordance with the Plan of Action framed by the National Headquarters, IRCS, New Delhi.

Bihar Flood Relief

Maharashtra State Branch has sent the following relief material to Bihar Red Cross for distribution to the victims of Bihar floods.

On 4th September 2017: 54 boxes of biscuits, 12 gani bags of Rice, 8 gani bags of Dal, 8 gani bags of Chuda (Poha), 50 kg of Jaggery, Tarpaulins 100 nos, Blankets 200 nos, Bed Sheets 500 nos, Sari 500 nos, Stoves 500 nos, Buckets 300 nos.

The First Aid Training Programme is undertaken by the Maharashtra State Branch since 2013. During this financial year we have conducted 51 First Aid trainings and total numbers of participants trained were 913.

Our esteemed clients for the first aid training include L & T Company, WNS, Aga Khan Development Network (AKDN), Toshiba and Elcerx.

World Red Cross Day was celebrated with medical camps in Mumbai, Gondia and Satara.

A 5 day SERV (FMR) instructor training programme was conducted at Jalgaon The programme was inaugurated by the chief guest Mr.Jevan Sonawane, Jalgaon Mahanagar Palika Aukat. Mr.Vinod Biyani - Hon. Secretary, Mr. Gani Meman, Mr.Raval District Disaster Officer and Red Cross Members were present.

Safer Access Steering Committee Meeting was held on 3rd August 2017 at Pune District Branch. Committee suggested printing of leaflets and posters on Red Cross activities and sending it to district branches which can be used for awareness sessions including organizing street plays.

A 3 Day SERV (FMR) Volunteers training programme was conducted at seven villages in Jalgaon District.

Villagers and students were given awareness on house hold water treatment benefits of safe drinking water on health, maintain personal hygiene, environment hygiene and proper sanitation.

Similar activities were conducted at Dhule and Mumbai including mock drills at Sulasgaon (Bhusawal).

Under the Youth Program World Malaria Day was celebrated at Borghar and Malin (Amade) Tal. Ambegaon, Dist. Pune. Hygiene kits were distributed under the WASH Program. Behaviour Change Communication Session in communities were conducted in various Talukas in Pune District.

Youth Program monitoring visits were conducted during the year. It was observed that people have adopted hygiene practices and diseases have reduced. Children are maintaining oral hygiene by brushing teeth daily, good hand washing practices was observed and children demonstrated the same. Regular awareness is done by the youth volunteers in the villages. Water availability has enhanced the youth programme children and community people have started taking bath regularly which has reduced skin infection problem, regular awareness by youth volunteers and medical camps has reduced diseases in area. Kitchen gardens are maintained by households. Under the Behaviour Change Communication Session personal and environmental hygiene, nutritional intervention and first aid information was given.

Under the Rural Livelihood Support Project 80 farmers were helped with 2400 kg of gram seeds. Crops are growing as per the availability of water. Kharif crops (Rice) assessment was undertaken total production was 3353kg. Very scanty rainfall and non-availability water resources have affected the rice production severely. Toor crops are doing well . Subsequently assessment will be undertaken in second week of April. Linking farmers with ongoing government schemes for farmers was appreciated by the local communities. Livestock beneficiaries finalization was under process as per guidelines in the POA 2018 of NHQ.

The IRCS Mahaarshtra State Branch programme team met Salekasa Tehsildar Mr. Prashant Sangode who talked on the work done by District branch through Livelihood project. He informed the team that many farmers had taken gram crops in selected community for the first time and became self-dependent in rabi farming. **This has prevented farmer's migration to nearby cities as a laborer.** Mr. Prashant Sangode also thanked Red Cross for linking those villages with ongoing government schemes and giving him the opportunity to visit those villages as till date no other Tehsildar before him had visited the place due to lack of accessibility to the area. He has assured full cooperation to the Red Cross in all the aspects.

Indian Red Cross Society – Mumbai has been working relentlessly for the upliftment of Society. IRCS – Mumbai is fervently involved with various projects viz. Education, Health care, Sanitation including Distribution of Sanitary Napkins, Malnutrition etc.

At the IRCS Thalassemia Day Care Centre, 49 children were given 1668 units of blood transfusions desferal worth Rs. 32,000/ was given to them. These patients were provided medical advice and counseling by Dr. Naidu.

Akola IRCS donated Rs.21,000/- for the Mission Morna River (Clean Morna River) Project which was lauded by our Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi in his Man Ki Baat. Chief Minister of Maharashtra Shri Devendra Fadnawis also mentioned the work of Akola Collector for clean Morna River.

Water Cup Competition was organized by Amir Khan's Pani Foundation in Maharashtra and the Arvi Tahsil in Wardha district was selected to participate.

At Arvi a medical Instrument Library was inaugurated by Dadaraoji Keche Ex. MLA Prashant Sawalakhe, President of Arvi Nagarpalika, DYSP Pradip Mairale, PSI Ashok Chaudhari and Dr. Arun Pawade.

On Ashadi Ekadashi, Barshi Sub-District Branch provided First Aid, a Search & Rescue Team and distributed medicines with the help of 450 Red Cross volunteers including JRC/YRC from 2nd to 4th July 2017.

Smt. Mangala N. Patil wife of the deceased late Mr. Nivruti B. Patil was handed over a cheque of Rs. 50,000/- by the Hon' ble Collector & Chairman of IRCS Jalgaon District Branch Shri. Kishore Raje Nimbalkar. I.A.S. under the Blood Donor accidental policy.

Indian Red Cross Society, Pune District Branch was awarded the N. C. Puri rotating trophy for the best Red Cross Activities for years 2015-2017 which was presented at AGM of the Maharashtra State Branch, Mumbai on 10th May 2018.

The garden reservation of the Lulla Nagar plot at S.No.594/part, village Munjeri has been changed to Public-Semi Public on recommendation of Pune Municipal Corporation by the Urban Department in the Development Plan of old Pune city limits. It has been decided that construction of only Deaf School will be taken up in the first phase. The infrastructure required for the school will be provided and the school will be shifted to the new premises at the earliest. The District Branch appointed Architect will be requested to submit the plan of school. Efforts will be made to raise the funds for construction through CSR support.

Round Table Silent Olympiad Mumbai arranged a sports competition. 33 students from Pune competed in the same out of which 13 won various trophies.. They organized a cultural programme. Our school got second prize for "Musical Yoga". Mr. Prashant Gadade got first prize for direction for "Musical Yoga".

Thane District Red Cross Branch set up a first aid counter during the annual district level conference 'DISCON 2018 'of International Rotary club held at Raymonds ground on 3rd & 4th Feb 2018.

The Ulhasnagar Sub-District Branch on 25th December,2017 observed the Annual Blood Donation Day in sweet Memory of Founder Hon.Secretary Late Shri Sakhawatrai S.Chotwani, 36 Blood Units collected and 160 needy Persons availed benefit of Thyroid and Free Diabetes check-up camps.

12 Red Cross Blood Banks in Maharashtra held camps wherein blood units were collected to facilitate to Thalassemia patients.

30 bedded Tertiary Treatment Center for acutely sick HIV/AIDS patients at Bel-Air Hospital are funded by Sir Dorabji Tata Trust. During the three month period from 1st April to 30th June 2017, 168 acutely sick patients were admitted of which 31 are still undergoing treatment. 126 patients recovered fully and have gone back to their families. 11 patients who had been admitted at an acute stage expired.

Fr.Tomy K MCBS, Director of Bel-Air Hospital and College of Nursing accompanied Sr.Lourdu Mary, Principal, Bel-Air College of Nursing to the US to attend the ANAC conference at Dallas from 2nd to 4th October 2017 where Sr.Lourdu Mary received the Excellence in Global HIV Nursing Award from the American Association of Nurses in AIDS Care.

Lila Poonawalla foundation has awarded scholarship of Rs.40,70,000/- to 59 students of the Bel-Air College of Nursing.

Three students from Bel – Air College of Nursing attended the three – day National Youth Festival organized by the Indian Red Cross Society (IRCS) NHQ in association with Amity University at Noida, New Delhi from 12th to 14th February 2018.

Dr.Jennifer E Dohrn DNP,CNM,FAAN, Director of Global Initiatives, Columbia University and Dr.Tonda L Hughes, PhD, RN, FAAN, Director of Global Health Research, Columbia University New York visited Bel-Air College of Nursing from 6th to 12 March 2018 to study the feasibility of a collaboration with Bel-Air. They left with a good impression of Bel-Air Hospital and promised to send 6 post graduate nursing students for a 6 week exposure to Bel-Air.

DISSEMINATION ACTIVITIES

World Red Cross Day Celebrations

8th to 9th May 2017

On the occasion of World Red Cross Day on 8th May 2017 various programs were organized in District Branches of Maharashtra. Under IRCS – ICRC 2017 supported programme Medical camps were organized in Mumbai, Gondia and Satara and Poster Making competition for underprivileged children at Mumbai was organized.

Medical Camp

Mumbai: A medical camp was organized at Mahatma Phule Nagar slum, Mankhurd. Total 140 people benefited from the camp. B.M.I, Diabetes and general checkup was done and free medicines were distributed to patients. Awareness on Red Cross work and its emblem was conducted.

The day was celebrated by organizing Poster Making Competitions for the underprivileged children. The competition was held in 4 Groups with the following

topics such as Group 1(Std 1 & 2) - Environment, Group 2 (Std 3 & 4) – Health & Hygiene, Group 3 (Std 5 to 7) – Save Water and Group 4 (Std 8 to 10) – Humanity & Unity. 85 kids participated in the competitions from Primary to Secondary Sections. After the competition the children were shown power point presentation about Junior Red Cross and video about Red Cross Movement – Story of an Idea by Mr. Bhavesh Sao, Junior Red Cross Co-ordinator. The students were briefed about Emblem Awareness too. Later we had Valedictory function to give away the prizes of the Poster Making Competition. Mrs. Manali Goregaonkar, Administrator of General Education Academy, Dr. Francesca Aranha, JRC Committee Member and Mrs. Debika Thapa Naidu, Assam Red Cross Volunteer were the guests for the function and were honored with floral bouquet. The prizes were distributed to all the winners through the Guests and motivated kids with their inspirational speech. Later all the children, teachers and peon were given snacks.

Gondia: Medical camp was organized for tribal villagers of Murkudo1, 2, 3, Tekatola & Dandari at Murkudo village.Total 240 villagers benefited through this camp. As these villages are situated in hills and Naxal affected, they have limited access to all government services, nearest health care center is at distance of over 35 km. Awareness on Red Cross work and its emblem was conducted for Villagers.

Satara: Medical camp was organized at Kalamgaon Village in Mahabaleshwar Taluka. This village has very limited access to health care as the nearest health care center is at distance of over 20 km. Over a 100 patients from Kalamgaon and other nearby villages benefited from the camp. Medicines were distributed free of cost to all.

A Doctor along with Medical Social Worker and 3 nurses conducted a health awareness program covering various topics including adolescent health, nutrition, child health, geriatric health, and personal hygiene after the camp for patients and villagers. A special session on history of Red Cross, Red Cross Movement and its activities across the world was also covered.

Awareness program on the origin of Red Cross, its history, and its activities across the world was organized for all patients, their care takers and staff of Bel-Air on the Red Cross Day. A video on Red Cross was also screened on the day. Over 450 people attended the program. It was an eye opener for most who attended as very few were aware about Red Cross and its scope of work.

Various games were organized for the patients and care takers on the occasion. Almost all the patients who were not bedridden participated. All the patients, their care takers, staff of both the hospital and college were provided special lunch.

A 5 Day SERV (FMR) Instructor training programme

On the final day (i.e. The 5th day) of the training an exam was conducted for participant's assessment. Exam consisted of Written exam (15 marks), Viva (15 marks) and Practical test (20 marks).

Mock Drills

A Mock Drill involving the villagers and students of Sulasgaon (Bhusawal) was conducted on 10th November 2017 to create awareness among the villagers and students about road accidents casualties caring methods and handling techniques and the ways to respond swiftly in times of such emergency situation. The operation began moments after the accident scene was created. A mock drill was carried out in the village chowk to prepare the villagers and students for any such emergency during any natural calamities and also to make the villagers and students aware.

On 7th March-2018 Mock Drills was conducted at MIDC Jalgaon area. Mrs. Ujawala Varma gave introduction of Red Cross and its work. District Fire Department officer took awareness session on fire, its causes and measures to be taken by the MIDC worker during fire which was followed by Mock Drills by involving MIDC worker by fire department experts.

A Mock Fire and Evacuation Drill involving the MIDC Jalgaon people were conducted on 7th March- 2018 to create awareness among the MIDC Worker about fire techniques and the ways to respond swiftly in times of such emergency situation. The "evacuation" operation began moments after the fire alarm alerted the students. The students were immediately evacuated from their classrooms and asked to gather at the assembly area. A mock drill was carried out in the school to prepare the students and teachers for any eventuality under the fire risk reduction programme. It was organized to check the readiness of the school to face any such emergency during any natural calamities and also to make the students and staff aware about the Fire Fighting rescue operation and its procedure.October 2017 to create awareness among the villagers and students about road accidents casualties caring methods and handling techniques and the ways to respond swiftly in times of such emergency situation. The operation began moments after the accident scene was created. A mock drill was carried out in the village chowk to prepare the villagers and students for any such emergency during any natural calamities and also to make the villagers and students aware.

Youth Programme

Celebration of World Malaria Day on 25th April 2017 at Borghar and Malin (Amade) Tal. Ambegaon, Dist. Pune

World Malaria Day was celebrated on 25th April 2017 at Borghar, and Malin Villages. Mrs. Bharati Kamble and Dr. D.B. Pardeshi, JRC Committee Member visited Borghar and Malin on 25th April 2017. They were joined by 4 College YRC youths from B.D. Kale Mahavidyalay, Ghodegaon.

Distributed the leaflets on promotion of control over Malaria from house to house in both villages. Posters on malaria were displayed at prominent places in both Villages. Dr. D. B. Pardeshi spoke to villagers at both the villagers on control over Malaria by simple methods. 63 people from Borghar and Malin (Amade) attended the programme. At end snacks were given to people. The overall response of the local population was encouraging.

Distribution of Hygiene Kits on 26 May 2017 at Borghar and Malin (Amade) Tal. Ambegaon, Dist. Pune

On 26 May 2017 hygiene kits was distributed WASH at Borghar and Malin (Amade and Pasarwadi) villages under Youth Programme . Mr. Manoj Sakat – First Aid Coordinator, IRCS Maharashtra State Branch, and Mrs. Bharati Kamble JRC/YRC Filed Officer, IRCS Pune District visited the villages on 26 May 2017. They were joined by Youths from Red Cross Youth Council of Pune and College YRC youth from B.D. Kale Mahavidyalay, Ghodegaon.

The Hygiene Kit in consisted of following items:-

- 1. Tooth Brush
- 2. Tooth Paste
- 3. Soap
- 4. Nail cutter
- 5. Napkin
- 6. Hand wash
- 7. Dustbin

Mrs. Bharati Kamble explained villagers importance of good Health, Hygiene and Sanitation in local language by using simple methods. Hygiene Kits were distributed by volunteers from house to house and awareness was created in Villages. Total 238 Kits were distributed.

The villagers thanked the Indian red Cross Society for distribution of hygiene kits.

Mr. Sachin Pardeshi spoke to villagers on following points:

- To improve personal hygiene & Health.
- To develop knowledge & Skills.
- To sensitize communities to use health and hygiene practices in their daily life.
- Explain principles & approaches to water, sanitation & hygiene

Dissemination on Red Cross origination under Behavior Change Communication Session in communities on 27th June 2017 at Borghar Village & Malin Village Tal. Ambegaon, Dist. Pune

Behavior change Communication session was organised in communities under WASH project on 27th June 2017 at Borghar & Malin Village. Mrs. Bharati Kamble and Mrs. Rupali Todmal visited the villages.

Mrs. Bharati Kamble & Mrs. Rupali Todmal spoke to villagers on health, Hygiene & Sanitation by simple methods. Mrs. Rupali Todmal spoke to Villagers and Malin School Students on information about Red Cross Organization and working of Red Cross. They explained history of Red Cross, emblem of Red Cross function of Red Cross Society. She gave the JRC/YRC activities information and JRC Song and Clap. 16 persons & 45 Students attended form Borghar & Malin. At the end of the programme refreshments were served to people present.

The overall response of the local population was encouraging.

Satara: Youth Programme Monitoring visit from 7th to 10th August 2017

As part of Youth programme a joint monitoring visit was conducted at Lamaj murra and Renushi murra villages of Satara. Dr. Parag Borkar (ICRC), Senir Dolas and Manoj Sakat visited the Bel- Air Hospital and villages.

8th August 2017

Discussion: Documentary on Bel -Air Hospital was shown to ICRC& MSB Staff after which presentation on work carried out in villages as per youth programme till now was given by Bel-Air Hospital Staff followed by discussion on the activities carried out and further implementation of plan of action.

Observation: Remaining activities are planned from September to November as per the availability of students and access to the villages after rains.

Discussion: Team met ICDS Supervisor Mrs. More and Standing committee chairman Mr. Rajendra Sitrajpure to take the follow up of work done in villages. ICDS supervisor has visited first time to those villages with our staff. Both have said will be available to provide any help needed in future as Bel Air is providing health services, linking community with Government Schemes like water shed etc and creating awareness on Health, Hygiene and Sanitation.

Observation: As the villages are situated in the hilly area most of the services are not reaching. A new Anganwadi has been started through which nutrition programme supported by other donors is also run. Anganwadi will be taken under the ICDS programme as more than fifteen children are there. Both were happy to have youth program in the area as there is immense need of such programme in the villages.

9th August 2017

As villages are situated on hill top and access to the villages by vehicle had been cutoff, the team trekked for 2 hours to reach the village which is a daily routine for school going children and community people.

Discussion: Two villages were visited by team and meetings were conducted in Anganwadies villagers and children were present. Villagers said that change has taken place in terms of health and Hygiene. Before commencing the youth programme there was no water available in the area people used to carry water from 2km distance. Bel- Air has installed water tanks donated by other donors in the villages and also linked community with watershed programme of state government as part of youth programme. Community is also trained in kitchen garden, seeds and other necessary guidance is provided to increase vegetable production

Observation: It was observed that people have adopted hygiene practices and diseases have reduced. Children are maintaining oral hygiene by brushing teeth daily, good hand washing practices was observed and children demonstrated the same. Regular awareness is done by the youth volunteers in the villages. Water availability has enhanced the youth programme children and community people have started taking bath regularly which has reduced skin infection problem, regular awareness by youth volunteers and medical camps has reduced diseases in area. Kitchen gardens are maintained by households.

10th August 2017: Meeting with Mr. T. B Sakloth (Assistant General Secretary), Dr. Parag Borkar shared observations of the monitoring visit to the village. Celebration of World Health Day, Organized Gram Sabha & Behaviour Change Communication Session in Communities on General Health Awareness on 9/09/2017 & 10/09/2017 at Borghar and Malin (Amade) Tal. Ambegaon, Dist.- Pune.

Gram Sabha was organized on the occasion of World Health Day and Behaviour change communication session in communities on general Health awareness on 9/09/2017 & 10/09/2017 at Borghar and Malin (Amade) Villages. Dr. D.B. Pardeshi –JRC Committee member, IRCS Pune. Mrs. Rupali Todmal -JRC Committee member, IRCS Pune. Mrs. Bharati Kamble –JRC Filed Officer, IRCS Pune. Prof. Dr. Manik Borade B.D. Kale Mahavidyalay, Ghodegaon. Visited the villages Borghar & Malin on 9/09/2017 & 10/09/2017. They were joined by 7 College YRC youths from by B.D. Kale Mahavidyalay, Ghodegaon. Dr. D.B. Pardeshi was the team leader and main speaker during the session.

Mr. Deepak and the Youth Red Cross Volunteers gave information about personal and environmental hygiene to the villagers. After discussions the team called all the children in the village along with their parents and demonstrated hand washing and brushing. Further they cut the nails of children and informed the parents to take care of hygiene which includes giving bath, oral hygiene, washing clothes etc.

The villagers were given information to reduce the use of plastic and also how to make manure from kitchen waste.

To address the issue of mal-nourishment and anemia among the children specially, our team educated the villagers about balanced diet, consumption of locally grown/ available vegetables. As Bel-Air has installed water supply systems in these villages, the villagers were motivated to start kitchen garden in their backyard and even in school and aganwadis. The team also distributed vegetables seeds to the villagers.

International Youth Day was celebrated on 25th & 26th October 2017 to recognize efforts of the world youth in enhancing global society. It also aimed to promote ways to engage them in becoming more actively involved in making positive contribution to their communities. We served refreshment to people present.

The overall response of the local population was encouraging.

Youth Programme 3 day Community First Aid Training at Satara from 2nd to 4th November

According to the Youth programme 2017, approved by National Headquarters, MSB organized 3 day First Aid trainings at Satara (Lamaj mura) From 2nd to 4th November 2017. The training was organized in the Aganwadi. Training was for Three day from 9.00 am to 5.00 pm. Dr. Vikas Kurne facilitated the training. There were 60 participants. The participants came from different villages. There was lot of enthusiasm and eagerness shown by the participants during the Three Day programme.

The programme was inaugurated by the Chief Guest Fr. John. Mr. Senir Dolas, Dr. Vikas Kurne, Mr. Manojkumar Sakat and Mr. Deepak Madne, Mr. Sandeep Baber were also present for the programme.

The participants were taught the "Basics of First Aid" which included and practical sessions. Topics covered were Introduction to First Aid, bleeding/wounds, poisoning, burns and CPR, recovery position, convulsions, choking, drowning and methods of tying bandages. Also covered Nutrition & Food Security, Water and Sanitation / Personal Hygiene.

The participants were also asked to give feedback and share their experiences and knowledge and skill which they received during the training.

At the end of the final session, the villagers felicitated the trainers and staff and they thanked Maharashtra State Branch for providing First Aid training.

Activity carried out.

- 1. District branch decided to undertake exposure visit in last week of November 2017.
- 2. District has finalized IEC material for youth programme , printing will start in last week of November 2017

3. As requested by the villagers and part of youth programme district will be providing septic tanks to the villagers of Ambade.

Sports Competitions as part of RC Humanitarian principles & health promotion on 18 November 2017 at Borghar & Malin Village Tal. Ambegaon, Dist. Pune

Sports competition was organized as a part of health promotion on 18th November 2017 at Borghar and Malin village. Mrs. Bharati Kamble and Mrs. Rupali Todmal visited and conducted event of sport competitions at New English School, Borghar and Z.P. Primary school, Malin.

Mr. Sanjay Shelke (The Sarpanch of Borghar village) was present at opening ceremony of the event at Borghar and Mrs. Hawsabai Asvale (The Sarpanch of Malin village) was present at opening ceremony of the event at Malin.

Following sports activities was included :

- 1. Kho-kho.
- 2. Kabaddi.
- 3. Langdi.

The school teachers encouraged students to participate in sport competitions. The participating students displayed their ability through these sports. The students, who didn't participate, encouraged the participant students by cheering.

Prizes were distributed amongst the winners. Sports Material and one water filter was distributed in both schools.

Exposure visit of selected community members to observe community development approaches at Gavadewadi Village, Tal. Ambegaon, Dist. Pune on 2/12/2017. (Participant villages- Amade, Pasarwadi and Borghar)

Following were the aims of the visit:

- 1. To visit a model village to observe community development
- 2. To obtain the general information of the village regarding fresh water, proper sanitation facilities, health and Hygiene, arrangements etc.

1. School of the village

The primary school is from 1st standard to 7th standard and high school is from 8th standard to 10th standard. We visited the primary school and gave the information to students about Red Cross and Youth Programme . We had a discussion with school teachers of primary school and got the information about the school.

The government schemes for students were displayed on notice board. We visited the science lab of high school. Equipments of science lab and posters were observed. Students are getting practical education from this lab.

High school students are doing the projects in science. Observed the Project models and equipment prepared by students. The agriculture classes and cooking classes are also conducted by teachers

One thousand liter Water filter is installed for drinking water for students.

2. Grampanchayat Visit.

From the information about the development of village it was understood that they built small bunds and prepared 5 lakes in village. This solved the water problem of village.

They have made the plantation of seven lac trees. The villagers are using gobargas for cooking. All their development is ecofriendly. Every home has separate toilet and washroom.

Any type of addiction is banned in Village.

The Village got first prize two times in Swachata Abhiyan and Sant Gadge Baba Gram Swachata Abhiyan. The villagers who came with us from Borghar, Amde, Pasarwadi and Malin Village for visit also discussed with the villagers of Gawadewadi. They could get some idea on how to develop their Village. Total 20 visitors came with us

3. Field visit

Small bunds and wells of the village, agriculture land, cow sheds and fertilizer projects along with the making of a fertilizer project in process was observed. Visited the Village Crematorium .

4. Occupation of villagers

Main occupation of the villagers is farming. The villagers are also doing business of selling milk and milk products and making the statues of gods and goddesses Because of development in Village one hundred and fifty families who had left the villagers returned back to village.

5. Health and sanitation.

There is no open drainage line in Village. Villagers have made mini garden nearby their homes with sanitation water. This prevents mosquitoes and other diseases.

Rural Livelihood Support Project

Field visit to Gondia from 24th to 27th May for Planning and Budgeting Irrigation Work

Mr. Senir Dolas, Programme Manager, IRCS, MSB and Sahadeo Rawoot, Economic Security Programme Responsible, ICRC were visited Murkudo, Tekatola & Dandari in Gondia District for planning and budgeting irrigation work.

Monitoring Visit to Gondia District Branch

From 5th to 12th June 2017, Mr. Senir Dolas, Programme Manager, IRCS, MSB and Manojkumar Sakat - FA/FMR Coordinator, IRCS, MSB were visited Gondia District Branch for monitoring and evaluation for the Rural Livelihood Support Project.

Objective of the visit

Intensive Rice Cultivation & Organic Farming training conducted in month of May and beneficiaries list was prepared. 12.5 kg Paddy and ½ kg Yellow Gram Seeds per farmer was distributed to 170 Farmers. Meeting with District Hon. Secretary, Hon. Project In charge & Field Officer and took Project updates

New identified village was Jabkasa at Deori Taluka.

Purchase of Paddy seeds logistic arrangements and correspondence with VCMF officials.

Paddy & Yellow Gram Seeds were distributed to the select villages (170 Beneficiaries) Tekatola, Dandari, Murkudo 1, 2 & 3 & Organic farming Training for newly selected village Jabkasa.

Meteting with Hon. Secretary, Hon. Treasurer, Hon. Project Incharge & Field officer to plan further implementations.

Monitoring Visit to Chandrapur & Gondia from 16th to 21st September 2017

Mr. Senir Dolas, Mr. Manojkumar Sakat, Dr. Prakash Dhote Hon Project Incharge Gondia District, Branch and Madhu Harinkhade Field Officer, Gondia District Branch visited Valni, Chinchavli & Rankodhi villages in Chandrapur taluka for meetings with community people

Activity conducted during the visit:

Total 230 farmers helped with kharif crops (1700 kgs Paddy, 230 kgs Toor, 170 kgs Kultha seeds) and 80 farmers with drums. Intensive rice cultivation & organic farming training was also given in June 2017.

Observation

Most of the population are tribal people and live in "kutcha" houses. Have marginal land holdings in forest area. As their farm lands are situated on hills water availability is less and farming is totally dependent on rain water only kharif crops such cotton, tuvar, urad and soyabean are produced based on the availability of rain. This year due to less rain crops are affected. People migrate to nearest tahisal in search of jobs as an agricultural labourer after rains.

Monitoring Project implementation and Account review.

From 22nd to 25th February 2018 Mr. Senir Dolas and Mr. Prashant Bhosale – Accountant, IRCS, MSB, visited Gondia District Branch for explain financial reporting to the Office Bearers and Field Officer.

Current State of implementation

80 farmers helped with 2400 kg of gram seeds. Crops are growing as per the availability of water. Kharif crops (Rice) assessment was undertaken total production is 3353kg. Very scanty rainfall and non-availability water resources has affected the rice production severely. Toor crops are doing well subsequently assessment will be undertaken in second week of April. Linking farmers with ongoing government schemes for farmers. Livestock beneficiaries finalisation under process.

Mr. Madhu updated on activities carried out under livelihood project till date and work to be undertaken in coming days.

Meeting at Animal Husbandry Department.

Team met with Salekasa Animal husbandry department head Dr. Waradpande who gave detail presentation on poultry project to the team. The team had felt that it would be advisable to take his help in livestock procurement, distribution and further follow up. The team requested Dr. Waradpande to provide detail project proposal on livestock (chicken and Goat).

Meeting with Tehsildar.

Team meet Salekasa Tehsildar Mr. Prashant Sangode who talked on the work done by District branch through Livelihood project. He informed team that many farmers had taken gram crops in selected community for the first time and became selfdependent in rabi farming. This has prevented farmer's migration to nearby cities as a laborer. Mr. Prashant Sangode also thanked Red Cross for linking those villages with ongoing government schemes and giving him the opportunity to visit those villages as till date no other Tehsildar before him had visited the place due to lack of accessibility to the area. He has assured full cooperation to the Red Cross in all the aspects.

Visit to the villages and meeting with community.

Team conducted visits to the farms and households and observed that farmers were busy peeling grams. Farmers were happy as they had got good production of Grams and Toor this year due to unseasonal showers. Team also visited households which were assisted by linking to the local market for selling food plates made from leaf. Team visited ponds which were earlier surveyed and assessed for micro irrigation work. However due to very scanty rains this year these ponds had no water.

After community visit farmers meeting were conducted where around 60 farmers attended. They shared with the team about the assistance they have received till now and thanked the Indian Red Cross Society for the same as it had increased their food production and income. However due to very scanty rains this year their paddy production was very badly affected which is their main crop. Farmers requested Indian Red Cross Society to help with irrigation and water resources. Team assured farmers of irrigation/ water resources help as per their need after working out with the concern departments.

Meeting at Gondia District Branch on 30th March 2018

Meeting was held at IRCS Gondia District Branch office on 30th March 2018. Mr. N. K. Singh Deputy Secretary IRCS NHQ, Mr. T. B. Sakloth Gen. Secretary IRCS MSB, Mr. Ravi Kasliwal Hon. Secretary Gondia District Branch, Mr. Gupta Hon .Treasurer, Dr. Prakash Dhote Project Incharge, Mr. Sahadev Rawooth ICRC, Mr. Senir Dolas Programme Manager IRCS MSB, Mr. Madhu Harinkhade Field officer, Mr. Yede and Mr. Bisen volunteers were present for meeting.

It was decided to help farmers this time also in kharif season by providing good variety of paddy seeds, System of Rice Intensification (SRI) and organic farming training , helping land less households and marginal farmers with livestock and take animal husbandry department's assistance for livestock project formulation , procurement, distribution and follow up. And to decide jointly micro irrigation / water resource strategies.

INDIAN RED CROSS SOCIETY - MUMBAI

Indian Red Cross Society – Mumbai has been working relentlessly for the upliftment of Society. IRCS – Mumbai is fervently involved with various projects viz. Education, Health care, Sanitation including Distribution of Sanitary Napkins, Malnutrition and Empowerment in the hindsight

Resource Mobilization

Under Resource Mobilization Drive, IRCS – Mumbai started a Donation Cards collection drive in Various Schools. The students participated enthusiastically and a sum of Rs.6,40,426 was collected for financing its own activities.

Menstrual Hygiene

IRCS-Mumbai has taken up the project to spread awareness on Menstrual Hygiene by distributing Sanitary Napkins for free to Underprivileged Girls and Organizing Talks on Menstrual Hygiene. IRCS – Mumbai's main objective behind this project is to beat the stigma attached to the word "Menstruation", educate young girls about Feminine Education, improve School Attendance, uplift the Confidence, Self-Esteem and Creativity of young girls, Reduce Incidents of Reproductive Tract Infection.

So far, IRCS – Mumbai has Distributed Approx. 5000 Sanitary Napkins to girls from Economic Weaker Section of the Society in Various Schools, Colleges and Slums of Mumbai. Each girl has been Provided with a Hamper of Sanitary Napkins consisting of 12 packets (each for One Month) having 14 Sanitary Napkins in each packet.

Mahalakshmi Race Course

A sum of Rs. 2,20,000/- was received from the Mahalakshmi Race Course. This Fund-Raising event was organized through the good offices of our Committee Member, Mrs. Chandra Ruia. Money collected was earmarked for rural development projects and the Blood Centre.

Healthcare

As per the MOU signed between The Adams Wylie Memorial Trust and the Saifee Hospital, patients are recommended to the Hospital for various tests and investigations. The patients need not to pay even a single rupee. From April'17 to March'18, the Trust paid a sum of Rs.58,28,578/- to the Hospital.

Essential Items Distribution

IRCS – Mumbai received clothes and various other essential materials such as Nutritional Food item, Wheel chairs, Medicines etc as Donation from Various sources. These materials were distributed to inhabitants in Tarapur, Boisar area, B.M Ruia College and Missionaries of Charity Orphanage, Vile Parle etc.

Thalassemia Day Care Centre

At the thalassemia day care centre, 43 children were given 1668 units of blood transfusions. These patients were provided medical advice and counselling by Dr. Naidu.

Blood Collection & Supply

IRCS – Mumbai Blood centre collected 6132 units of blood form April'17 to March' 18.

IRCS, BLOOD CENTRE, MUMBAI

Blood Collection & Supply

During the period 1st April 2017 to 31st March 2018, 6132 units of blood were collected of which 350 units were collected in house and 5770 units were collected at 146 blood donation camps, 12 units were received from other Hospitals. Of the total blood collection 3.52% of the blood was discarded due to various reasons and 98% of the blood was processed into components.

Total 31% of blood was issued free.

Post donation Counseling

During the above mentioned period 58 donors were found to be positive for infectious diseases, 40 donors were positive for HbsAg of which 26 donors did not come and 14 donors were counseled, 7 donors were positive for VDRL of which 4 donors did not come and 3 donors were counseled, 9 donors were positive for HCV of which 6 donors did not come and 3 donors were counseled and 2 donors were positive for HIV of which 1 donors did not come and 1 donor was counseled.

Blood Supply to storage Centers

There are seven centers which are registered as storage centre 1559 units of blood, 746 units of fresh frozen plasma, 309 units platelet and 28 Cryoprecipitate, were issued to them.

Six centers are on contract basis and 665 units of blood, 143 units of FFP, 212 units of RDP and 39 units of Cryoprecipitate were issued to them.

Financial Report

On financial front, during the period 1st April 2017 to 31stMarch 2018 Rs.70,78,755/was collected as service charges for blood and its components while the expenses aggregated to Rs. 1,33,49,862/- thereby resulting in an overall deficit of Rs.62,71,107/-

Plasma supplied to Celestial

560.201 litres of fresh frozen plasma and 229.635 litres of CDP amounting Rs.16,79,712/ was given to Celestial Biological for fractionation.

Thalassemia day care centre

At the thalassemia day care centre, 49 children were given 1668 units of blood transfusions desferal worth Rs. 32,000/ was given to them. These patients were provided medical advice and counseling by Dr. Naidu.

Participation at the workshop

3rd to 5th November 2017– Dr. Bharucha and Dr. Naidu was invited as a faculty for a ISTM conference at Lucknow.

8th to 10th December 2017 - Dr. Bharucha and Dr. Naidu went as faculty for ISBT conference at Kota.

INDIAN RED CROSS SOCIETY, MAHARASHTRA STATE BRANCH, Dr. RUSTOMJI B. BILLIMORIA BEL-AIR HOSPITAL, PANCHGANI, REPORT 2017-18

1. Bel-Air Hospital

Founded by Dr. Rustomji B. Billimoria in 1912 as a T.B. Sanatorium, Bel-Air stands on the sprawling 44 acres of land known as Dalkeith in Panchgani, Satara District, which was gifted by Sir Dorabji Tata. Its dry and bracing climate being ideal for the recovery of TB patients has been one of the premier TB hospitals in India. Dr.Rustomji Billimoria founder of Bel-Air was the recipient of the first gold medal of the Anti-TB Association of India and Padma Bhushan. In 1964 Bel-Air exceeded its anti-TB targets set by the Government of India by 400%.

The hospital has healed thousands of TB patients at a time when TB was considered incurable and had no medicine. Most of the patients were poor and were treated free. Visits of celebrities became a regular feature and it became customary for every State Governor as well as the Chief Ministers, to pay a visit to Bel-Air, which occasioned the opening of a new facility or block.

For several decades it was run as a private trust medical institution, but in 1964, to ensure its continuity, the founder transferred the management of the hospital and sanatorium to the Indian Red Cross Society, Maharashtra State Branch and since then it has been a Red Cross project.

However by 1970s with the discovery of Anti TB drugs and the consequent shift to domiciliary treatment for TB rather than Sanatorium model, coupled with dwindling donations, lack of proper staff and efficient management, Bel-Air passed through very bad days. By 1993 almost all the 58 buildings had been dilapidated. There wasn't any trained medical staff, the number of patients had dipped to below thirty. Accumulated deficit was running into lakhs of rupees. Labour unrest was creating lot of problems. And even the land was being encroached upon. Bel-Air was almost on the verge of a closure.

Resurrection of Bel-Air

The revival phase of the Hospital started after 1994 when Red Cross entrusted the management and administration of Bel-Air to MCBS (Missionary Congregation of the Blessed Sacrament).

The initial revival phase was painful and traumatic. Lack of funds was just one element, there were much serious problems like labour unrest and militancy. There were some influential political forces and rich land sharks who had set their eyes on the vast property in the hill station town. They had conspired to close down the hospital at the time of crisis and take over the land to make it a resort. During the troubled times from 1994 to 2002, then Governor of Maharashtra, Dr. P.C. Alexander's patronage was invaluable.

The new management took strong steps to overcome the crisis. Over the years, Bel-Air Sanatorium enlarged its mission from TB to address the challenges of an unfolding disaster relating to HIV/AIDS. Since 1995 Bel-Air began to administer to HIV/AIDS patients when hospitals refused to admit them, government gave no support and Anti-Retroviral Therapy (ART) was not available.

Over the years Bel-Air pioneered the treatment and care of HIV/AIDS patients in India and is one of the best treatment centers in the country and is a National Training Centre today. Bel-Air admitted and treated more than twenty two thousand HIV/ AIDS patients until today. Dr. A.P. J. Abdul Kalam, as the President of India, visited Bel-Air in 2003.

Today this 240 bedded hospital is both a general hospital as well as an HIV treatment centre, while TB continues to be the focus. Bel-Air is a major NGO partner with the Governments of Maharashtra and India in the implementation of Revised National TB Control Programme (RNTCP).

As TB is making a resurgence, Bel-Air is fully committed to continue its original mission of combating TB, now with the added dimension of treating MDR TB. As part of the RNTCP, Bel-Air is running a TB Unit and also it was sanctioned a 8 bedded Drug Resistant TB Center on 10th January 2018 and also a CBNAAT machine. It is the only hospital in the nongovernment sector admitting and treating MDR TB patients. In 2014, Bel-Air Hospital was awarded the Times of India Healthcare Achievers Award 2014 for being the best in India in the category of "Innovation in managing long term condition".

1. DEPARTMENT OF TUBERCULOSIS

Bel-Air continues to run a DOTs Centre, a Microscopy Centre and a TB Unit for Mahableshwar Taluka. Apart from collaborating with the RNTCP programme, in-house treatment facilities for MDR and sputum positive TB patients is also provided.

2. DEPARTMENTOF HIV/AIDS

Bel-Air is one of the premier institutes of treatment, care, support and training in HIV/ AIDS in India. Patients admitted in Bel-Air are treated for Opportunistic Infections and initiated on Anti Retroviral Therapy (ART) and are then referred to Government ART centres which is nearest to their place of residence. Patients come to Bel-Air from most of the districts of Maharashtra and north Karnataka. Of the 240 beds in the hospital more than 100 beds are usually occupied by HIV infected patients. Most of the patients admitted are from very poor background, are in advanced stage of AIDS. Most of the patients are provided treatment on concessional basis.

30 bedded Tertiary Treatment Center for acutely sick HIV/AIDS patients at Bel-Air Hospital funded by Sir Dorabji Tata Trust

During the three month period from 1st April to 30th June 2017, 168 acutely sick patients were admitted of which 31 are still undergoing treatment. 126 patients recovered fully and have gone back to their families. 11 patients who had been admitted at an acute stage expired.

World AIDS Day

World AIDS Day was observed on 1st December 2017.

3. THE GENERAL HOSPITAL WING

The Hospital has departments of general medicine, gynaecology, orthopaedics, general surgery etc. The Hospital has I.C.U., a state of the art operation theatre with laparoscopic systems and C-Arm. There is also a well equipped Laboratory. Weekly clinics is available for Ophthalmology.

Non-medical services

All festivals are celebrated with great fervour by decorating the wards and hospital premises especially for Ganesh Chathurthi, Diwali and Christmas. Trained Medical Social Workers conduct regular yoga sessions for recovering patients along with their bystanders.

1. Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying Consolidated financial statements of Indian Red Cross Society, Maharashtra State Branch ("the Trust"), which comprise the Balance Sheet as at March 31, 2018 and the Income and Expenditure Account for the year then ended, and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

2. Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

The management of the trust is responsible for the preparation of these financial statements that give a true and fair view of the financial position and financial performance of the Trust. This responsibility includes maintenance of adequate accounting records in accordance with the provisions of the Maharashtra Public Trusts Act, 1950 (the Act) for safeguarding the assets of the Trust and for preventing and detecting frauds and other irregularities; selection and application of appropriate accounting policies; making judgement and estimates that are reasonable and prudent; design, implementation and maintenance of adequate internal internal financial controls, that are operating effectively for ensuring the accuracy and completeness of the accounting records, relevant to the preparation and presentation of the financial statements that give a true and fair view and are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

3. Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. We have taken into account the provisions of the Act, the accounting and auditing standards and matters which are required to be included in the audit report under the provisions of the Act and Rules made thereunder. We conducted our audit in accordance with the Standards on Auditing issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India. Those Standards require that we comply with ethical requirements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedure to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgement, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal financial control relevant to the Trust's preparation of the financial statements, that give a true and fair view, in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion whether the Trust has in place an adequate internal financial controls. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of the accounting estimates made by the Trust's management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

4. Opinion

In our opinion and to the best of our information and according to the explanations given to us, the aforesaid financial statements give the information required by the Act in the manner so required and give a true and fair view in conformity with the accounting principles generally accepted in India :

- i) in the case of the Balance Sheet, of the state of affairs of the Trust as at March 31, 2018;
- ii) in case of the Income and Expenditure Account, of the excess of income over expenditure for the year ended on that date;
- 5. In exercise of powers conferred by the first provision to sub-section (4) of Section I of Maharashtra Public Trust Act, 1950 the Government of Maharashtra have vide notification no. BPT/1390/350(81)-VI, published in the Official Gazette dated March 19, 1992 directed that the Indian Red Cross Society, Maharashtra State Branch and its branches situated in the State of Maharashtra registered as a

Public Trust under the said Act, shall with effect from the date of publication of the said Notification in the Official Gazette be exemptd from all provisions of the said Act, except for those relating to the registration contained in the Chapter IV of the said Act. Accordingly, the Act and Rules framed under Chapter V of the The Bombay Public Trust Act, 1950 is not applicable to the Trust and hence this report is not in pursuance of Rule 19 of The Maharashtra Public Trust Rules, 1951.

- 6. Further to our comments in paragraph 6 above, we report that :
 - i) we have sought and obtained all the information and explanations which to the best of our knowledge and belief were necessary for the purpose of our audit;
 - ii) in our opinion proper books of account as required by law have been kept by the Trust so far as appears from our examination of those books;
 - iii) The Balance Sheet and Income and Expenditure Account dealt with by this report are in agreement with the books of accounts and are prepared in accordance with the accounting standards, as applicable, issued by The Institute of Chartered Accountants of India.

Schedule S

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements for financial year ended 31st March 2018

1. Background and Nature of Operations of the Trust

Indian Red Cross Society (IRCS) is a statutory body established under an Act of Parliament (Act No. VX of 1920). The Maharashtra State Branch IRCS ('the Trust") is registered as a trust under the Maharashtra Public Trusts Acts, 1950 ('the act') The Government of Maharashtra has vide notification No. BPT/1390/350(81)-VI, published in the official Gazette dated March 19,1992 exempted the Trust from all the provisions of the Act except Chapter IV relating to registration.

The Indian Red Cross Society (IRCS) is a national federation with more than 650 IRCS branches, It acts as an auxiliary to the government in providing medical aid and relief in times of calamities without favour of caste and creed and provides services in healthcare and social welfare programs. The Trust is also responsible for coordinating the activities of various Red Cross branches in Maharashtra.

2. Statement of Significant Accounting Policies

a) Basis of preparation

As explained in para I above, the Trust is exempted from the provisions of the Bombay Public Trust Act. Accordingly these consolidated financials statements have been prepared based on the Technical Guide on Accounting and Auditing in Not-for-Profit Organisations issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India ('ICAI")

The consolidated financial statements (CFS) have been prepared to comply in all material respects with the mandatory Accounting Standards issued by the ICAI. The CFS have been prepared under the historical cost convention on an accrual basis. The accounting policies have been consistently applied by the Trust and are consistent with those used in the previous year.

Principles of consolidation

The financial statements consolidate the financial results of Maharashtra State Branch of the Indian Red Cross Society, Staff Provident Fund, Bel-Air Sanatorium and Bel Air College of Nursing & Junior Red Cross Sub- Committee.

The financial statements of all the above units have been combined on a line-byline basis by adding together the value of like items of assets, liabilities, income and expenses after eliminating inter-unit balances.

Based on Rules 5 (j) and 5 (k) which define the powers of district branches, composition or operations (in any form) of all district level branches are not controlled by the State General Committee of the Maharashtra State Branch. Therefore all district level branches are excluded from consolidation in the aforesaid financial statements.

b) Classification of Donations received

i) Unrestricted Funds / General Donations :

These funds are used in accordance with the objects of the Society, at the discretion of the trustees / members of the governing body.

ii) Designated Funds :

These funds are set aside by the trustees / members of the governing body out of unrestricted funds for specific future purpose or projects.

iii) Restricted / Endowment Funds:

Restricted funds can only be used for particular purposes within the objects of the Society, Restrictions arise when stipulated by the donor or under a law. Endowment funds are a form of restricted funds that are received with a stipulation from the donor that the amount received should not be used for any purpose; only the income earned from these funds can be used for general or specific purpose in accordance with the terms of contribution.

c) Fixed Assets

Fixed assets are stated at cost, less grants received, accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. Cost comprises the purchase price, value of donations received in kind and any attributable cost of bringing the asset to its working condition for its intended use.

d) Depreciation

Depreciation is provided on written Down Value method at the rates prescribed in Income Tax Act, 1961.

e) Investments

All the Investments are considered as Long term and are accounted for at cost of acquisition. Provision is made if the dimination in value of investment is not considered temporary.

f) Government grants and subsidies

Grants and subsidies from the government/ others are generally recognized when there is reasonable assurance that the grant/subsidy will be received and all attaching conditions will be complied with. When the grant or subsidy relates to an expense item, it is recognized as income over the periods necessary to match it on a systematic basis to the costs which it is intended to compensate. Where the grant or subsidy relates to an asset, it is treated as deferred income, which is recognized in the income statement on a systematic and rational basis over the useful life of the asset.

Donations are accounted for on receipt basis.

g) Income Recognition

Interest income is recognised on a time proportion basis taking into account the amount outstanding and the rate applicable.

Dividend income is recognised when the holders' right to receive payment is established by the balance sheet date.

Income earned on letting out hall on hire is recognised on accrual basis.

Lease income is recognised on a straight line basis for the period of the lease

Income in the nature of tuition fees received from students for an academic year is recognized when there is a reasonable certainty of its realization / ultimate collection. As the academic year is from June to March, the fees received are treated as income over that period.

Income from college activities is recognized when there is a reasonable certainly of its realization / ultimate collection.

All other sources of income like contribution and subscription, from City Branch/ districts of the Indian Red Cross Society, etc. are accounted for receipt basis.

h) Retirement Benefits

Retirement benefits in the form of Provident Fund are charged to the Income & Expenditure Account of the year when the contributions to the respective funds are due. Gratuity liability under the Payment of Gratuity act is accrued and provided for on the basis of an actuarial valuation made at the end of each financial year.

i) Provisions

A provision is recognised when the trust has a present obligation as a result of past events; where it is probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation and in respect of which a reliable estimate can be made. Provisions are not discounted to their present values and are determined based on best estimate required to settle the obligation at the balance sheet date. Provision for expenditure relating to voluntary retirement is made when the employee accepts the offer of early retirement.

j) Inventory

Inventory of medicines and consumables are valued at lower of cost and net realizable value. Cost includes purchase cost and other incidental charges.

3. Income Taxes

Returns of income under the Income Tax Act, 1961 are being filed for the Consolidated Accounts of Maharashtra State Branch. The Chief Commissioner of Income Tax, Mumbai has granted approval U/s 10(23C)(via) of the Income Tax Act, 1961 to the Indian Red Cross Society (Maharashtra State Branch) vide order dated 28.01.2010 and the approval is valid from Ass. Yr. 2009 - 10 and onwards until withdrawn.

4. Details pertaining to certain fixed assets like itemized breakup of Furniture and Fixtures, Electrical Installation, Medical Apparatus, Office Equipment and

Computers are not available with the trust. The Gross Block in respect of these assets aggregates to Rs. 4,80,07,991/- and the Net Block aggregates to Rs. 1,59,17,819/-.

5. Based on the nature of records maintained by the Trust, it is not possible to correlate the designated/ endowments funds with the investments made, consequently the information has not been provided. Further, there is no accretion to the endowment funds by way of interest earned on the investments.

6. Contingencies

There is an appeal by Bel-Air Sanatorium pending in the High Court against the order of the Industrial Court. In accordance with the order of the Industrial Court, the unit is required to reinstate six dismissed employees with full back wages. The Management has obtained a stay of the operation of this order from the High Court, and is of the view that the liability is not probable in this case. Pending final resolution of this matter, no provision have been made for the estimated liability of Rs. 24,78,601/- for back wages of the dismissed employees.

7. The future minimum lease payment in respect of trust property given on lease to Missionary Congregation of the Blessed Sacrament (MCBS) for running a school for a term of 30 years commencing October 2003 are as follows :

9. In case of Staff Provident Fund, interest credited during the year to members account has been calculated on monthly closing balances @ 7.5%

1. Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Indian Red Cross Society, Maharashtra State Branch ("the Trust"), which comprise the Balance Sheet as at March 31, 2018 and the Income and Expenditure Account for the year then ended, and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

2. Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

The management of the trust is responsible for the preparation of these financial statements that give a true and fair view of the financial position and financial performance of the Trust. This responsibility includes maintenance of adequate accounting records in accordance with the provisions of the Maharashtra Public Trusts Act, 1950 (the Act) for safeguarding the assets of the Trust and for preventing and detecting frauds and other irregularities; selection and application of appropriate accounting policies; making judgement and estimates that are reasonable and prudent; design, implementation and maintenance of adequate internal internal financial controls, that are operating effectively for ensuring the accuracy and completeness of the accounting records, relevant to the preparation and presentation of the financial statements that give a true and fair view and are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

3. Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. We have taken into account the provisions of the Act, the accounting and auditing standards and matters which are required to be included in the audit report under the provisions of the Act and Rules made thereunder. We conducted our audit in accordance with the Standards on Auditing issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India. Those Standards require that we comply with ethical requirements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedure to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgement, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. - ii) in case of the Income and Expenditure Account, of the excess of income over expenditure for the year ended on that date;
- 5. In exercise of powers conferred by the first provision to sub-section (4) of Section I of Maharashtra Public Trust Act, 1950 the Government of Maharashtra have vide notification no. BPT/1390/350(81)-VI, published in the Official Gazette dated March 19, 1992 directed that the Indian Red Cross Society, Maharashtra State Branch and its branches situated in the State of Maharashtra registered as a

Public Trust under the said Act, shall with effect from the date of publication of the said Notification in the Official Gazette be exemptd from all provisions of the said Act, except for those relating to the registration contained in the Chapter IV of the said Act. Accordingly, the Act and Rules framed under Chapter V of the The Maharashtra Public Trust Act, 1950 is not applicable to the Trust and hence this report is not in pursuance of Rule 19 of The Maharashtra Public Trust Rules, 1951.

- 6. Further to our comments in paragraph 5 above, we report that :
 - we have sought and obtained all the information and explanations which to the best of our knowledge and belief were necessary for the purpose of our audit;
 - ii) in our opinion proper books of account as required by law have been kept by the unit so far as appears from our examination of those books;
 - iii) The Balance Sheet and Income and Expenditure Account dealt with by this report are in agreement with the books of accounts and are prepared in accordance with the accounting standards, as applicable, issued by The Institute of Chartered Accountants of India.

1. Background and Nature of Operations

Indian Red Cross Society (IRCS) is a statutory body established under an Act of Parliament (Act No. VX of 1920). The Maharashtra State Branch IRCS ('the Trust'') is registered as trust under the Maharashtra Public Trusts Acts, 1950 ('the act') The Government of Maharashtra has vide notification No. BPT/1390/350(81)-VI, published in the official Gazette dated March 19,1992 exempted the Trust from all the provisions of the Act except Chapter IV relating to registration.

The Indian Red Cross Society (IRCS) is a national federation with more than 650 IRCS branches, It acts as an auxiliary to the government in providing medical aid and relief in times of calamities without favour of caste and creed and provides services in healthcare and social welfare programs. The Trust is also responsible for coordinating the activities of various Red Cross branches in Maharashtra.

These financial statements pertain to the results of the Mumbai Headquarters of Maharashtra State Branch of the Indian Red Cross Society. They do not include the financial results of Bel-Air Sanatorium (Hospital Unit), Bel-Air College of Nursing, Staff Provident Fund and Junior Red Cross Sub-Committee, which are also part of Maharashtra State Branch of the Indian Red Cross Society.

2. Statement of Significant Accounting Policies

a) Basis of preparation

As explained in para I above, the Trust is exempted from the provisions of the Maharashtra Public Trust Act. Accordingly these financials statements have been prepared based on the Technical Guide on Accounting and Auditing in Not-for-Profit Organisations issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India ('ICAI")

The financial statements have been prepared to comply in all material respects with the mandatory Accounting Standards issued by the ICAI. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost

convention on an accrual basis. The accounting policies have been consistently applied by the Trust and are consistent with those used in the previous year.

b) Classification of Donations received

i) Unrestricted funds / General Donations :

These funds are used in accordance with the objects of the Society, at the discretion of the trustees / members of the governing body.

ii) Designated Funds :

These funds are set aside by the trustees / members of the governing body out of unrestricted funds for specific future purpose or projects.

iii) Restricted / Endowment Funds:

Restricted funds can only be used for particular purposes within the objects of the Society, Restrictions arise when stipulated by the donor or under a law. Endowment funds are a form of restricted funds that are received with a stipulation from the donor that the amount received should not be used for any purpose; only the income earned from these funds can be used for general or specific purpose in accordance with the terms of contribution.

c) Fixed Assets

Fixed assets are stated at cost, including grants received (if any), less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. Cost comprises the purchase price, fair value of donations received in kind and any attributable cost of bringing the asset to its working condition for its intended use.

d) Depreciation

Depreciation is provided on written Down Value method at the rates prescribed in Income Tax Act, 1961.

e) Investments

All the Investments are considered as Long term and are accounted for at cost of acquisition. Provision is made if the dimination in value of investment is not considered temporary.

f) Government grants and subsidies

Grants and subsidies from the government/ others are generally recognized when there is reasonable assurance that a grant/subsidy will be received and all attaching conditions will be complied with. When the grant or subsidy relates to an expense item, it is recognized as income over the periods necessary to match it on a systematic basis to the costs which it is intended to compensate. Where a grant or subsidy relates to an asset, it is treated as deferred income, which is recognized in the income statement on a systematic and rational basis over the useful life of the asset.

Donations are accounted for on receipt basis.

g) Income Recognition

Interest income is recognised on a time proportion basis taking into account the amount outstanding and the rate applicable.

Dividend income is recognised when the holders' right to receive payment is established by the balance sheet date.

All other sources of income like contribution and subscription, from City Branch/districts of the Indian Red Cross Society, etc. are accounted for on receipt basis.

Income earned on letting out the hall on hire is recognised on accrual basis.

h) Retirement Benefits

Retirement benefits in the form of Provident Fund are charged to the Profit & Loss Account of the year when the contributions to the respective funds are due. Gratuity liability under the Payment of Gratuity act is accrued and provided for on the basis of an actuarial valuation made at the end of each financial year.

i) Provisions

A provision is recognised when an enterprise has a present obligation as a result of past events; where it is probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation and in respect of which a reliable estimate

can be made. Provisions are not discounted to their present value and are determined based on best estimate required to settle the obligation at the balance sheet date. These are reviewed at each balance sheet date and adjusted to reflect the current best estimates.

3. Income Taxes

Returns of income under the Income Tax Act, 1961 are being filed for the Consolidated Accounts of Maharashtra State Branch. The Chief Commissioner of Income Tax, Mumbai has granted approval U/s 10(23C)(via) of the Income Tax Act, 1961 to the Indian Red Cross Society (Maharashtra State Branch) vide order dated 28.01.2010 and the approval is valid from Ass. Yr. 2009 - 10 and onwards until withdrawn.

- Administration charges recovery of Rs.10,87,826/- from Mumbai Disaster Relief account being interest on investments and Bank deposits. This is based on a resolution passed by the managing committee.
 - b) During the year Rs. 8,98,948/- is shown as administration charges recovery from CSR contribution made by Breach Candy Hospital Trust.
- 5. Based on the nature of records maintained by the Trust, it is not possible to correlate the designated / endowment funds with the investments held, consequently the information has not been provided in some cases.

6. Comparatives

Previous year figures have been regrouped or reclassified to confirm to the current year's presentation.

This responsibility includes maintenance of adequate accounting records inaccordance with the provisions of the Bombay Public Trusts Act, 1950 (the Act) for safeguarding the assets of the unit and for preventing and detecting frauds and other irregularities; selection and application of appropriate accounting policies; making judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent; design, implementation and maintenance of adequate internal financial control, that are operating effectively for ensuring the accuracy and completeness of the accounting records, relevant to the preparation and presentation of the financial statements that give a true and fair view and are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

3 Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. We have taken into account the provisions of the Act, the accounting

and auditing standards and matters which are required to be included in the audit report under the provisions of the Act and Rules made thereunder. We conducted our audit in accordance with the Standards on Auditing issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India. Those Standards require that we comply with ethical requirements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal financial control relevant to the unit's preparation of the financial statements, that give a true and fair view, in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on whether the unit has in place an adequate internal financial controls. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of the accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

4 Opinion

In our opinion and to the best of our information and according to the explanations given to us, the aforesaid financial statements give the information required by the Act in the manner so required and give a true and fair view in conformity with the accounting principles generally accepted in India :

- i) in the case of the Balance Sheet, of the state of affairs of the unit as at March 31, 2018;
- ii) in the case of the Income and Expenditure Account, of the surplus for the year ended on that date.
- 5 We report that in, exercise of powers conferred by the first provision to sub-section (4) of Section I of Bombay Public Trust Act, 1950 the Government of Maharashtra

have vide notification no. BPT/1390/350(81)-VI, published in the Official Gazette dated March 19, 1992 directed that the Indian Red Cross Society, Maharashtra State Branch and its branches situated in the State of Maharashtra registered as a Public Trust under the said Act, shall with effect from the date of publication of the said Notification in the Official Gazette be exempted from all provisions of the said Act, except for those relating to the registration contained in the Chapter IV of the said Act. Accordingly, the Act and Rules framed under Chapter V of the The Bombay Public Trust Act, 1950 is not applicable to the Trust and hence this report is not in pursuance of Rule 19 of The Bombay Public Trust Rules, 1951.

6 We report that:

- We have sought and obtained all the information and explanations which to the best of our knowledge and belief were necessary for the purpose of our audit;
- ii) in our opinion proper books of account as required by law have been kept by the Unit so far as appears from our examination of those books;
- iii) the Balance Sheet and the Income and Expenditure account dealt with by this Report are in agreement with the books of accounts.

Schedule O – Notes to Accounts

1. Background and Nature of Operations

Bel – Air Sanatorium is a constituent unit of Maharashtra State Branch of the Indian Red Cross Society (IRCS). The Indian Red Cross Society (IRCS) is a statutory body established under an Act of Parliament (Act No. VX of 1920).

The Maharashtra State Branch of the IRCS ("the trust') is registered as a trust under the Maharashtra Public Trust Act, 1950 ('the Act'). The Government of Maharashtra has vide notification No.BPT/1390/350(81)-VI, published in the official gazette dated March 19, 1992, exempted the trust from all the provision of the Act except Chapter IV relating to registration.

The original mission of Bel – Air Sanatorium was to provide rehabilitation to tuberculosis patients. Presently it has restructured its facilities to cater not only to tuberculosis patients but also to provide support to PLWHIV/AIDS. This project (Community Care Centre) is funded by a grant from Maharashtra State Aids Control Society. Additionally it also conducts a Care and Support Project, which is supported by Avert Society. These financials do not include the financial results of the nursing college which is also part of the Bel – Air Sanatorium.

2. Statement of Significant Accounting Policies

a) Basis of Preparation:

As explained in Para 1 above, the trust is exempted from all the provisions of the Act, accordingly these financials are prepared based on the Technical Guide on Accounting and Auditing in Non-for-Profit Organizations issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India ("ICAI").

These financial statements have been prepared to comply in all material respects with the mandatory Accounting Standards issued by the ICAI. These financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention on an accrual basis. The accounting policies have been consistently applied by the Trust and are consistent with those used in the previous year.

b) Fixed Assets:

Fixed Assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. Cost comprises the purchase price and any attributable cost of bringing the asset to its working condition for its intended use.

c) Depreciation:

Depreciation is provided on Written down Value Method at the rates prescribed in Income Tax Act, 1961.

d) Investments:

All the Investments are considered as Long term and are accounted for at cost of acquisition. Provision is made if the diminution in value of investment is not considered temporary.

e) Retirement Benefits:

The cost of retirement benefits in the form of Provident Fund is charged to Income and Expenditure Account for the year when the contributions to the respective funds are due. Gratuity liability under the Payment of Gratuity Act is accrued and provided for on the basis of an actuarial valuation made at the end of each financial year.

f) Government Grants and Subsidies :

Grants and subsidies from the government are recognized when there is reasonable assurance that the grant / subsidy will be received and all attaching conditions are complied with. When the grant or subsidy relates to an expenses item, it is recognized as income over the periods necessary to match them on a systematic basis to the costs, which it is intended to compensate. Where the grant or subsidy relates to an asset, it is treated as a deferred income which is recognized in the income statement on a systematic and rational basis over the useful life of the asset.

Donations are accounted for on receipt basis.

g) Income Recognition:

Interest Income is recognized on a time proportion basis taking into account the amount outstanding and the rate applicable.

Dividend Income is recognized when the unit holders' right to receive payment is established by the Balance Sheet Date.

Lease income is recognized on a straight line basis for the period of the lease.

Income from hospital activities is recognized when there is a reasonable certainty of its realization/ ultimate collection.

h) Inventory:

The Trust values the inventory of medicines and consumables at Lower of Cost and net Realizable value. Cost includes purchase cost and other incidental charges.

Net realizable value is the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business less estimated costs to make the sale.

i) Provisions:

A provision is recognized when an enterprise has a present obligation as a result of past event; it is probable that an outflow of cash resources will be required to settle the obligation, in respect of which a reliable estimate can be made. Provisions are not discounted to present value and are determined based on best estimate required to settle the obligation at the balance sheet date. These are reviewed at each balance sheet date and adjusted to reflect the current best estimates. Provision for expenditure relating to voluntary retirement is made when the employee accepts the offer of early retirement.

3. Sundry Creditors:

Accounts of certain creditors are subject to reconciliation, pending confirmation of balances and the credit balances in regard to payables have been taken as reflected in the books of accounts and adopted for the purpose of preparation of the Balance Sheet.

- 4. Details pertaining to certain fixed assets like itemized breakup of furniture and fixtures, Electrical installation, Medical apparatus, Office Equipments and Computers are not available with the trust & are subject to reconciliation with physical.
- 5. Based on the nature of records maintained by the Trust, it is not possible to correlate the designated / endowments funds towards the investment made, consequently the information has not been provided. Further, there is no accretion to the endowment funds by way of interest earned on the investment.

- a) There is an appeal by Bel Air Sanatorium pending in the High Court against the order of the Industrial Court. According to the order of the Industrial court, the unit is required to reinstate six dismissed employees with full back wages. The management has obtained a stay of the operation of this order from the High Court, and is of the view that the liability is not probable in this case. Accordingly, pending final resolution of this matter, no provisions has been made for the estimated liability of Rs.24,78,601 for back wages of the dismissed employees.
- b) No Provision is made in the accounts for penal interest and demands that may arise on account of defaults under Chapter XVII-B of the Income Tax Act, 1961, in respect of tax deduction at source as the liability in respect thereof is not ascertainable.

1 Report on the financial statements

1. Background and Nature of Operations

Bel – Air College of Nursing is a constituent unit of Maharashtra State Branch of the Indian Red Cross Society (IRCS). The Indian Red Cross Society (IRCS) is a statutory body established under an Act of Parliament (Act No,VX of 1920).

Indian Nursing Council vide its Certificate No.18-19/3004-INC dated, 6 September, 2006 approved the course conducted by Bel-Air College of Nursing.

The Maharashtra State Branch of IRCS ("the trust") is registered as a trust under the Maharashtra Public Trust Act, 1950 ('the Act'). The Government of Maharashtra has vide notification No.BPT/1390/350(81)-VI, published in the official gazette dated March 19, 1992, exempted the trust from all the provision of the Act except Chapter IV relating to registration.

The original mission of $\mathsf{Bel} - \mathsf{Air}$ Nursing is to provide quality education in the field of nursing.

2. Statement of Significant Accounting Policies :

a) Basis of Preparation:

As explained in Para 1 above, the trust is exempted from all the provisions of the Act, accordingly these financials are prepared based on the Technical Guide on Accounting and Auditing in Non-for-Profit Organizations issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India ("ICAI").

These financial statements have been prepared to comply in all material respects with the mandatory Accounting Standards issued by the ICAI. These financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention on an accrual basis. The accounting policies have been consistently applied by the Trust and are consistent with those used in the previous year.

b) Fixed Assets:

Fixed Assets are stated at cost, including grants received (if any), less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. Cost comprises the purchase price, fair value of

donations received in kind and any attributable cost of bringing the asset to its working condition for its intended use.

c) Depreciation:

Depreciation is provided on Written down Value Method at the rates prescribed in Income Tax Act, 1961.

d) Government grants and subsidies :

Grants and subsidies from the government / others are generally recognized when there is reasonable assurance that the grant / subsidy will be received and all attaching conditions will be complied with. When the grant or subsidy relates to an expenses items, it is recognized as income over the periods necessary to match them on a systematic basis to the costs, which it is intended to compensate. Where the grant or subsidy relates to an assets, it is treated as a deferred Income, which is recognized in the income statement on a systematic and rational basis over the useful life of the assets.

e) Income Recognition

Income in the nature of tuition fees received from students for an academic year is recognized when there is a reasonable certainty of its realization / ultimate collection. As the college operates from June to May during an academic year, the fees received are not deferred beyond the year end.

f) Provisions:

A provision is recognized when an enterprise has a present obligation as a result of past event; it is probable that an outflow of cash resources will be required to settle the obligation, respect of which a reliable estimate can be made. Provisions are not discounted to its present value and are determined based on best estimate required to settle the obligation at the balance sheet date. These are reviewed at each balance sheet date and adjusted to reflect the current best estimates. Provision for expenditure relating to voluntary retirement is made when the employee accepts the offer of early retirement.

g) Gratuity:

Gratuity Liability under the Payment of Gratuity Act is accrued and provided for on the basis of an actuarial valuation made at the end of each financial year.

This responsibility includes maintenance of adequate accounting records in accordance with the provisions of the Maharashtra Public Trusts Act, 1950 (the Act) for safeguarding the assets of the Trust and for preventing and detecting frauds and other irregularities; selection and application of appropriate accounting policies; making judgement and estimates that are reasonable and prudent; design, implementation and maintenance of adequate internal internal financial controls, that are operating effectively for ensuring the accuracy and completeness of the accounting records, relevant to the preparation and presentation of the financial statements that give a true and fair view and are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

3. Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. We have taken into account the provisions of the Act, the accounting and auditing standards and matters which are required to be included in the audit report under the provisions of the Act and Rules made thereunder. We conducted our audit in accordance with the Standards on Auditing issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India. Those Standards require that we comply with ethical requirements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedure to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgement, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal financial control relevant to the Trust's preparation of the financial statements, that give a true and fair view, in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion whether the Trust has in place an adequate internal financial controls. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of the accounting estimates made by the Trust's management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

4. Emphasis of the matter

Schedule E - Loans and Advances amounting to Rs.2,06,986/- includes Rs.1,15,950/being amounts receivable on account of various activities that are outstanding for period of three years and above which are subject to confirmation and reconciliation. We are unable to comment on whether any adjustment would be required on completion of the reconciliation process.

5 Opinion

In our opinion and to the best of our information and according to the explanations given to us, subject to our observation in para 4 above whose impact cannot be ascertained, the aforesaid financial statements give the information required by the Act in the manner so required and give a true and fair view in conformity with the accounting principles generally accepted in India :

- i) in the case of the Balance Sheet, of the state of affairs of the Trust as at March 31, 2018;
- ii) in case of the Income and Expenditure Account, of the excess of expenditure over income for the year ended on that date;
- 6 In exercise of powers conferred by the first provision to sub-section (4) of Section I of Maharashtra Public Trust Act, 1950 the Government of Maharashtra have vide notification no. BPT/1390/350(81)-VI, published in the Official Gazette dated March 19, 1992 directed

that the Indian Red Cross Society, Maharashtra State Branch and its branches situated in the State of Maharashtra registered as a Public Trust under the said Act, shall with effect from the date of publication of the said Notification in the Official Gazette be exemptd from all provisions of the said Act, except for those relating to the registration contained in the Chapter IV of the said Act. Accordingly, the Act and Rules framed under Chapter V of the The Bombay Public Trust Act, 1950 is not applicable to the Trust and hence this report is not in pursuance of Rule 19 of The Maharashtra Public Trust Rules, 1951.

7 Further to our comments in paragraph 6 above, we report that :

- i) we have sought and obtained all the information and explanations which to the best of our knowledge and belief were necessary for the purpose of our audit;
- ii) in our opinion proper books of account as required by law have been kept by the unit so far as appears from our examination of those books;
- iii) The Balance Sheet and Income and Expenditure Account dealt with by this report are in agreement with the books of accounts and are prepared in accordance with the accounting standards, as applicable, issued by The Institute of Chartered Accountants of India.

SCHEDULE Q - NOTES TO ACCOUNTS

1. Background and Nature of Operations

Junior Red Cross Sub- Committee is unit of Indian Red Cross Society (IRCS) is a statutory body established under an Act of Parliament (Act No. VX of 1920). The Maharashtra State Branch IRCS ('the Trust") is registered as trust under the Maharashtra Public Trusts Acts, 1950 ('the act') The Government of Maharashtra has vide notification No. BPT/1390/350(81)-VI, published in the official Gazette dated March 19,1992 exempted the Trust from all the provisions of the Act except Chapter IV relating to registration.

Junior Red Cross Sub- Committee carries out numerous activities in the field of health, Social Service, National integration and international understanding.

2. Statement of Significant Accounting Policies

a) Basis of preparation

As explained in para I above, the Trust is exempted from the provisions of the Maharashtra Public Trust Act. Accordingly these financials statements have been prepared based on the Technical Guide on Accounting and Auditing in Not-for-Profit Organisations issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India ('ICAI")

The financial statements have been prepared to comply in all material respects with the mandatory Accounting Standards issued by the ICAI. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention on an accrual basis. The accounting policies have been consistently applied by the Trust and are consistent with those used in the previous year.

b) Classification of Donations received

i) Unrestricted funds / General Donations :

These funds are used in accordance with the objects of the Society, at the discretion of the trustees / members of the governing body.

ii) Designated Funds :

These funds are set aside by the trustees / members of the governing body out of unrestricted funds for specific future purpose or projects.

iii) Restricted / Endowment Funds:

Restricted funds can only be used for particular purposes within the objects of the Society, Restrictions arise when stipulated by the donor or under a law. Endowment funds are a form of restricted funds that are received with a stipulation from the donor that the amount received should not be used for any

purpose; only the income earned from these funds can be used for general or specific purpose in accordance with the terms of contribution.

c) Fixed Assets

Fixed assets are stated at cost, including grants received (if any), less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. Cost comprises the purchase price, fair value of donations received in kind and any attributable cost of bringing the asset to its working condition for its intended use.

d) Depreciation

Depreciation is provided on written Down Value method at the rates prescribed in Income Tax Act, 1961.

e) Investments

All the Investments are considered as Long term and are accounted for at cost of acquisition. Provision is made if the dimination in value of investment is not considered temporary.

f) Government grants and subsidies

Grants and subsidies from the government/ others are generally recognized when there is reasonable assurance that a grant/subsidy will be received and all attaching conditions will be complied with. When the grant or subsidy relates to an expense item, it is recognized as income over the periods necessary to match it on a systematic basis to the costs which it is intended to compensate. Where a grant or subsidy relates to an asset, it is treated as deferred income, which is recognized in the income statement on a systematic and rational basis over the useful life of the asset.

Donations are accounted for on receipt basis.

g) Income Recognition

Interest income is recognised on a time proportion basis taking into account the amount outstanding and the rate applicable.

Dividend income is recognised when the holders' right to receive payment is established by the balance sheet date.

All other sources of income like contribution and subscription, from City Branch/ districts of the Indian Red Cross Society, etc. are accounted for on receipt basis.

h) Retirement Benefits

Retirement benefits in the form of Provident Fund are charged to the Profit & Loss Account of the year when the contributions to the respective funds are due. Gratuity liability under the Payment of Gratuity act is accrued and provided for on the basis of an actuarial valuation made at the end of each financial year.

i) Provisions

A provision is recognised when an enterprise has a present obligation as a result of past events; where it is probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation and in respect of which a reliable estimate can be made. Provisions are not discounted to their present value and are determined based on best estimate required to settle the obligation at the balance sheet date. These are reviewed at each balance sheet date and adjusted to reflect the current best estimates.

j) Donation in Kind

Donation in kind has been accounted for at the estimated cost of items. The donation comprises of mostly food items, stationery and has been utilized at the various functions/ camps and events, organized by Junior Red Cross, for which they were received. Thus there is no stock at the end of the year.

3. Income Taxes

Returns of income under the Income Tax Act, 1961 are being filed for the Consolidated Accounts of Maharashtra State Branch. The Chief Commissioner of Income Tax, Mumbai has granted approval U/s 10(23C)(via) of the Income Tax Act, 1961 to the Indian Red Cross Society (Maharashtra State Branch) vide order dated 28.01.2010 and the approval is valid from Ass. Yr. 2009 - 10 and onwards until withdrawn.

4 Comparatives
